JOHN TAYLOR DEAD.

Pioneer and Veteran of Polk Goes to His Long Rest. A15

Wednesday morning at the Dallas hospital John Taylor passed away after several weeks' illness from acute nephritis. He was out on the streets a few days ago, but was not feeling at all well, and had to go back to bed. The funeral will be held from the Evangelical church on the Luckiamute tomorrow, and interment will be made in the Taylor cemetery. A15

Deceased was born March 31, 1841, in Cass county, Mich., and came to Oregon in 1852, settling in Polk county, where he has lived almost continuously since, with the exception of the time he served in the regular army during the war, and a few years prior to 1871, which he spent in California county. He enlisted in the regular army under Captain Lafolette, Nov. 19, 1854, serving at Vancouver and in eastern Oregon, and was honorably discharged at Fort Yamhill June 30, 1866. His company was designated as Company A First Oregon Infantry. He was a son of Judge Taylor, who was county judge of Polk county about 1867, and a brother of Anderson Taylor, who died some years ago. John Taylor was a peculiar man in some respects, but one of the best hearted ones we ever knew. Jovial to a great degree his many jests will be sadly missed by his oldtime friends. When we first purchased the Itemizer in 1883, he requested that we never allow his name to appear in our columns, he not caring for such notoriety, and until this day, when he can no longer make the request, we have failed to mention his comings or goings. He was a man of good deeds, but did not desire anyone to know of it. Not long since he was visiting a niece in Union county, and found her sadly in need of a good stove. On his return to Dallas he purchased the best range Craven Bros. had and had it shipped to her prepaid, but specified that no card be attached or any clue given as to the donor. A good portion of his life was spent on the Luckiamute, but he lived for several years in Dallas, where he followed the occupation of painter. He formerly owned a farm on the Luckiamute, but we believe that has been sold. He never married and has no nearer relatives than nephews and nieces, one of whom, Mr. Fred Johnson, was down today to look after the remains. He was a stepbrother of Henry Riggs, a former merchant of this place, and father of T. A. Riggs and Mrs. H. L. Crider. A15

ALL A MISTAKE.

Loganberry Company Not Expected to Change Name of Derry. A15

Considerable ink has been wasted by a number of papers recently regarding what they surmised as a contemplated change of Derry station to Loganberry by the Oregon Loganberry company which bought the Thielsen farm near that place.
