COMMERCIAL CLUB

Club Desires Dallas Train to Leave Portland Depot Earlier

The Club met last night in regular session with President Foster in the chair.

An application signed by the J. K. Armsby Co. for membership was received and on motion of A. B. Muir they were elected to membership.

A communication was received from the Twentieth National Irrigation Congress relative to sending representatives to the congress which meets in Salt Lake City September 30th to October 3d. No action taken and communication placed on file.

A communication from the Oregon Development League regarding the sending of the best baby and its mother to the state fair was placed on file.

Chairman W. V. Fuller, of finance committee, reported favorably on Fiske bill and advised that bill be paid. On motion of A. B. Muir report was accepted.

Owing to the absence of J. L. White at Independence, A. B. Muir reported that the manufacturers' committee suggested advancing \$250 on the Adjustable Electric Socket Company's lot, and to take lien on property for that amount for two years. If at the expiration of two years the plant is still in successful operation the lot will become the property of the company; if not it will revert to the club. On motion of Soehren the report was adopted, and the committee instructed to make necessary arrangements.

On motion of Soehren the committee on preliminary arrangements for the county fair was made permanent with full power to act in regard to details of the fair and the appointment of sub-committees.

On motion of A. B. Muir the matter of a better schedule for the evening train leaving Portland for Dallas so as to eliminate the frequent delays in reaching Dallas, was referred to the Railroad committee with instructions to act.

N. L. Guy reported for the amusement committee that the band concerts would start again the first Saturday in September.

Fuller reported that the matter of placing signs throughout the county indicating the number of miles to Dallas, has practically been completed, there remaining but two or three of the small signs yet to be placed.

The entertaining of the delegates to the Oregon Rural Mail Carriers' convention to be held here on September 1st and 2nd, was discussed and on motion of Doc Patterson the chair appointed a committee of three to act with the Carriers' fair committee. The committee named were, D. P. Patterson, Edwin Jacobson and N. L. Guy.

Funny Land Proposition.

Some inexcusable peculiarities of land settlement of the early days are frequently run up against now. For instance: Lewis Ritner owns what is known as the Bartlow Whitlow donation land claim. Some time since he found out that some 26 acres up on a mountain were not included in his government patent, although it was always supposed by him that he owned the strip. Inquiry at the Portland land office showed that they had it down there as belonging to the claim, but further inquiry at Washington by Clerk Smith brought a statement that in a letter from Bartlow Whitlow, dated June, 1859, had relinquished it to the government. The reason for his doing so is incomprehensible. As it now stands, the land is entirely valueless to anyone. It is government land, and can only be secured by homesteading. On the side of a mountain, it could not be utilized by anyone to live on or make a living from. It is of no value to him simply as a little more range for his stock. So there you are.

Seeing Oregon by Auto.

Geo. H. Himes, the noted historian and custodian of Oregon's historical records, was a caller this morning. Mr. Himes is touring the valley in an auto in company with Captain W. H. Pope, a nephew of Territorial Governor Geo. H. Abernathy, and is well known to many of us as the genial captain of one of the old time steamers that used to take us to Frisco. Captain Pope's nephew is also of the party. While not a Polk boy, Mr. Himes married here 45 years ago, his wife being Miss Anna F. Riggs, a second cousin of Cass and Seth. New quarters will soon have to be provided for Mr. Himes historical records, and he is wondering where it will be. He has every Oregon paper on file for all these previous years.

NATIVE DAUGHTER DIES

Mrs. Grace Milliner Passes Away Suddenly

The residents of Buena Vista, were shocked to hear of the passing of Mrs. Grace Milliner at her home at Raymond, Wash., Saturday morning, her death being caused by a complication of diseases. Mrs. Milliner was a well known native daughter, having lived here nearly continuously since birth, and was highly esteemed among her many friends. The funeral service was held Monday afternoon from the home of the deceased's mother, Mrs. R. P. Hall, Rev. Harry McCain, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating, of which she was a member since 1909; interment took place in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Grace E. Hall was born in Buena Vista, April 1, 1883, and died at Raymond, Wash., August 17, 1912, aged 29 years, 4 months and 16 days. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Hall, her father losing his life several years ago while working in the timber. Besides her husband and mother she leaves two daughters, Gladys Embree and Frances Mae, and one brother, Rupert Hall, of Buena Vista, and one sister, Miss Nettie Hall, of Airline, and a host of relatives and friends.

Miss Hall was united in marriage with Moses E. Milliner on December 6, 1903, at Oregon City.
