ONE WAY OF KNOCKING.

The big metropolitan papers are in some instances
about the biggest knockers that the state of Oregon has
to contend with. Their knocking is to a great extent
unintentional, but it does the work just the same, as it
is heralded all over the land and puts our state in a very
false position—one not our due when the real truth be-
comes known. We refer to their crop reports, such as
the one at the end of last week. After a rain such as
we had, it is the practice of the Portland papers to wire
their correspondents if any damage was done. In most
cases their correspondents seem to be a set of grannies
ready to cry out before they are hurt, and in this in-
stance a good many of them wired back that the grain
was practically ruined, the hops were all down and un-
told damage done to the fruit and other crops. Of
course, it is always found after a few days that no ma-
terial damage is done to any crop, but the knocking has
been done, and prospective settlers in the east and mid-
dle west told that Oregon has had a failure of crops and
is not the home of good crops which in our same moods
we are never tired of boasting of. Last spring it was told
the world by those same papers that our prune crop
was a failure, when the truth was only enough of the
buds were damaged to so thin down the trees as to give
forth an excellent crop of much better and larger fruit,
and relieve the trees of the overburden which they had
carried the year before, and would again have had to
bear this season. So it was with the hay crop not long
ago. To hear the correspondents tell it, we would have
no crop this year at all, and our stock would suffer for
lack of feed, but in the saner days of a few days after
it was found that we had harvested a bumper crop of
hay, mostly of first class quality, and would have a
great plenty for our own needs and hundreds of tons
for export. Our last rain did bring fear into the hearts
of many, coming as it did in the midst of harvest, when
we can usually depend on a long continued dry spell,
but it has not worked to any serious damage on any
crop, and has greatly benefited others. The itemizer
always has and always will deprecate this proneness
of many people to jump at conclusions as to the damage
one to crops by any little out of the way happening.
The crops of this great Willamette valley always turn
out pretty near excellent, whatever the conditions, es-
pecially on the west side of the Willamette valley, and
we do not think it is right for any paper, whether a
metropolitan or country one, to assist in any way in
giving them a black eye. It is hard enough to continually
present to newcomers our advantages of soil and climate,
especially when said prospective settlers can throw up
to you that they saw exactly the opposite in some state
paper. Let our aim be to boost in all directions, and
not by misstatements tear down the fabric of everyday
labor.

Several have congratulated the editor upon an article
of co-operation last week, and asserted that they would
like to see something started in that direction for hop
growers, especially. That they know such to be the
right thing but hesitate to take the initiative. No great
reform was ever instituted unless there was some one
with the requisite back bone to lead and develop the
idea, and a hop grower's union would be vigorously
combated from the start, and find many pitfalls in its
pathway, most of them laid by those who would be the
most benefited by such a coalition. Even after organ-
ization should be effected, there would be plenty of
backsliders, men who would take the word of slick
tongued outsiders in preference to what they really know
is for their best interests, just as there are men today
who will contract their hops when they know that by
such action they are helping just that much to keep
down the price and work their own interests irretriev-
able injury. As Barnum said, the American people like
to be fooled, and they certainly show it to be a truth in
the matter of raising hops. An amazing indifference
is continually paid to their own interests, that seems
hardly excusable under experiences continually placed
before their eyes. Apple and other fruit growers of
certain portions of the northwest have thoroughly dem-
onstrated that in union there is strength, and that by
co-operation of all growers, a goodly price can be easily
secured for a prime article. Yet with such evidence
good and plenty, and the advantages to accrue fully be-
fore them as to what other sections have done, our
growers will continue to let outsiders dictate to them,
get bamboozled at every turn, and be wrongfully de-
prived of what is a just compensation for the labor they
perform. If it were not for these conditions, our hop
growers instead of having the middleman tell them to-
day that he will give them 18 cents for their crops
could turn the matter around, and say to him or to the
consumer alone, we have so many bales of hops for sale
at 30 cents. When you want them, come and get them.
And they would come, the speculator and his gambling
propositions soon be eliminated, and business be right-
fully and much more advantageously conducted between
the grower and consumer alone. In a very short time
our fruit raisers will be up against this same proposi-
tion, and it is high time that they should be taking steps
to avoid the tentacles of the middleman which reach
out all over the land to the continued detriment of
all growers and simply enrich the pockets of a class of

people for which these United States should have no
use whatever. The quicker gobetweens are frowned on
by the grower and business methods used by him to
market his produce, just that much sooner will he gath-
er in the profits that are rightfully the portion of the
man who is behind the plow. This serving of two mas-
ters is and always will be detrimental to his interests.

By the refusal of a prominent alienist to accept the
position of superintendent of the new eastern Oregon
asylum, giving as his grounds for such refusal that the
site for various reasons was entirely unsuited for such
an institution, Governor West has once more been
proven to be in the right. The present site was select-
ed by Governor Bowerman to pay a political debt, turn-
ed down by the board but upheld by a republican legis-
lature. So our treasury is depleted and big money spent
for things that will have to be in time rectified at still
greater expense.

Hotel men of the state have launched a campaign to
attract Eastern tourists to Oregon. At a recent meet-
ing of the state association, it was decided to carry an
extensive advertising and publicity work throughout
the east to show the scenic beauties of the Pacific North-
west to the intending traveler. It is the plan to distrib-
ute many folders and pieces of attractive literature il-
lustrating this subject.

The population of Oregon is to be increased between
30,000,000 and 35,000,000 this year, only the newcomers
are young salmon and not people. That number of ba-
by salmon will be liberated into the streams of the state
from the various hatcheries. The fish, when released,
will be from five to eight months old and are expected
to fight their own battles thereafter.

Governor West out for blood in attempting to see to
it that law, order and public decency are upheld and in-
fractions punished by the officials elected to do so,
whether they want to or not. As he has again said that
he will refuse the governorship for a second time, we
can rightly surmise that our governor is, like Bryan,
simply out for the public good, and cares not for the
enemies he makes.

A great race, an electric race, is on between the Hill
and Harriman lines for the securing of the trade of
this valley of ours, and every where that they are so
far competing has been benefited by it. We hope to see
the race strike old Polk in the near future, that we may
secure some of the benefits other sections are enjoying.

In a case sent back by the supreme to the circuit
court of Polk last week, we again welcome a long lost
friend—a case that has adorned our docket for lo these
20-odd years, and the final outcome of which is yet only
to be surmised.

Just think of it. Over two long months more yet of
this political fever. Is it not enough to make most any
man desire a much longer term of presidential occupa-
cy.

Motor Trip From San Jose.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Crider arrived in Dallas Friday evening
in their 4-cylinder, 50 horse-power,
four passenger Kissel car, all the way from San Jose, California.
They have returned to make
their home in Dallas, for an in-
definite period at least, owing to
how it agrees with Mrs. Crider's
health. In coming up here they
provided themselves with a com-
plete camping outfit, and have
taken the trip leisurely, averaging
about 8 hours a day of run-
ning time, stopping to fish or
for other pleasures, as they saw
fit. The actual distance travel-
ed, and making no side trips,
was 761 miles, and 45 gallons of
gasoline were used. No acci-
dents of any kind occurred, and
Mr. Crider did not have to take
a tool out of the box. Many
nails were picked up, but not so
as to puncture a tire. The actual
running time was 57 1-2 hours,
but they were ten days on the
way. Excellent roads were
found along the route until they
got into Oregon where they got
pretty bad, between Roseburg
and Eugene being the worst, al-
though the very worst they
struck was in Polk county, just
out of Buena Vista on the other
side. Mr. Crider has returned
to assume the management of
the New Scott, and intends to
make it the best hotel on the
West Side. He likes the job of
catering to the public's needs in
this respect, and is bound to
succeed in his endeavor. His
many old friends here in his na-
tive town are glad to see him
and wife once more residents of
Dallas.
