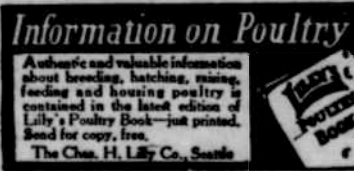

THAT THREE DOLLARS.

Bernette versus Weldon Before Justice Holman Tuesday.

An hour and a half before Justice Holman Tuesday afternoon finally gave the outcome of the scrap at Black Rock some weeks ago when Pete Bernette was knocked off the platform to the railroad 5 feet 8 inches below, by Reams Weldon, striking his head against a rail, and sustaining injuries which have kept him in the Dallas hospital ever since. Judge Holman fined the defendant \$10 and costs, amounting to some \$40, and the same was paid.

Rush, Wm. Finley, Ralph Chilcotte, and Walter Baker were called for the prosecution, and John Blasch and May Weldon for the defense. The trouble seems to have risen over the purchase of a pair of ladies shoes from Mrs. Weldon by Bernette, though what he bought them for was not made clear, and seemed an unprovoked assault any farther than that. The prosecuting witness, and the wife of the defendant are Finns, and the whole trouble the result of matters in which the court had no concern.
