A PIONEER GONE.

Zach Howe Passes Away at Home of Daughter in Seattle.

Wires came Tuesday afternoon to Will Howe and H. L. Fenton apprising them of the death at Seattle of Zach Howe that morning. His death was caused by the malady incident to old age, he being 77. He had been a resident of Seattle for the last 15 years, when he left his large farm at Perrydale. The remains were brought to Dallas this morning, and laid to rest in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, Rev. D. L. Fields officiating at services at the grave. He was one of the oldest members of the A. O. U. W. in Polk county, being a charter member of the Perrydale lodge, and when the order succeeded there, coming in with the Dal as organization. Members of that order took part in the funeral services.

Zachariah Howe was born in Newtontown, Indiana, October 2, 1835, and in pioneer times came with his parents and three brothers to Oregon, settling in Polk County, where they took up claims, and by frugality and good business qualities a massed competency. Henry Howe passed away some years ago, and Robert a couple of years ago, James being now the only one left of the family. The three other brothers made their homes in and near Dallas, but Zach resided near Perrydale on his large farm until the death of his wife, the scattering of his family and old age make it advisable for him to reside in Seattle. A valued friend of the writer for the last 30 years, we hesitate for language sufficient to portray our appreciation of his worth as a citizen. He was a true example of a Christian gentleman, a man whose life was not lived for himself alone, but for the good of those around him, on whose honor and integrity there was no blemish, and who counted as his friends all who knew him thoroughly enough to appreciate his many good qualities.

The relatives left to mourn him are one brother, James, of Dallas, sons, George and Will, of Spokane, daughter, Kate, and son, Sam, of Seattle, besides several nephews and nieces, of which Mr. Will Howe, of Dallas, is one.

KICK TO COMMISSION.

Monmouth Desires Better Transportation at that Place.

The Monmouth Commercial club held its annual meeting Thursday night and elected officers. P. H. Johnson, owner of the Monmouth Book Store, was elected president; O. A. Wolverton, postmaster, vice president; A. H. Craven, treasurer, and W. E. Smith, cashier of the Polk County Bank, secretary.

Plans for an advertising campaign were discussed at some length. The community plan was discarded for lack of funds, but reliable figures and data concerning this section are to be gathered and incorporated into a little book let for distribution by the Oregon Development league and by local business men.

The following complaint signed by prominent business men and citizens of Monmouth and vicinity, will be forwarded to the railway commission, directed at the Southern Pacific and Independence & Monmouth railroad:

"First—That except from the Union depot in Portland it is impossible to purchase tickets to Monmouth or check baggage; that except to points on the West Side division, tickets from Monmouth can not be purchased.

"Second—That tickets cannot be bought or baggage checked from Monmouth to Independence.

This is regarded as an especially inconvenient ruling as the distance is only two miles and the charges are held to be exorbitant in consideration of the distance traveled; also tickets have to be bought in Independence often with only a few minutes to spare before boarding the other train.

"Third—That depot facilities in Monmouth for both passengers and freight are in bad condition, the depot without lights, and in some respects dangerous and unsanitary. The depot building is close to the track and in its unlighted condition is dangerous at night.

"Fourth—There is no schedule for either passengers or freight from this point over the Salem & Falls City road."

Another point not embodied in this complaint but for which a remedy is wanted is the manner of running the trains into and through Monmouth. Of the eight or ten trains a day only about half arrive here in approved manner, with the engine in front. The others back in.

The complaint asks for the hearing to be made in Monmouth.

WILSON WINS WELL.

The Democrats Secure the House by Good Majority and Maybe the Senate.

Majority of County Ticket Elected of the Democratic Complexion.

The great fight is at last over, except the shouting, and the result is about as forecasted by the Itemizer, even a little better. Wilson was elected president by a perfect landslide of votes in his favor, and will have such a large majority in the electoral college that the other two candidates are hardly worth considering. His election has carried with him a greatly increased democratic majority in the lower house in congress and it may be that the tide set so firmly to democracy that a senate of that complexion will also be elected. The party also won out in the election of a number of governors of different states, and several states that had been heretofore classed as firmly republican turned over to the democratic column. In fact the national election has been as satisfying to democracy as anything could possibly be, and it is now up to our g and old party to make good for the confidence reposed in us, and to show all that we can manage things as good as if not better than they have been heretofore. Business interests will be protected to the amount that they should be in every line, and the country will continue to grow and prosper as never before. Changes will of course be made, as was promised if the party were put in power, but none of them will be of a radical nature, not tending to disrupt commercial circles in any way.

RESULT IN STATE.

So far in the state election there is hardly any doubt but what we have also caught the big fish, as we go to press it being nearly certain from the incomplete returns that Harry Lane has been elected U. S. senator over Ben Selling. With Jonathan Bourne making a bad third in the race, and showing that the people of Oregon are for the man who has advocated the primary law consistently and without attempting to divert it to his own ends. Hawley is re-elected to Congress, Olcott gets in as secretary of State, Mickle as dairy and food commissioner, and Atchinson as railroad commissioner. Sinnott got in as congressman in the second district and the notorious Lafferty was again elected from the third district.



LANE IN LEAD.

Portland, 2 p. m. Nov. 7th—(Special to the Itemizer.) According to latest reports from city and state Lane leads for senator by 1000 voters over Selling, with Bourne a bad third.

The people of Oregon showed their capacity for making their own laws to a far greater extent than was expected of them, and also that the length of the ballot did not seriously disturb them when making an intelligent vote on all the questions submitted. It was expected that numerous voters would skip the amendments altogether, but the result shows that they took a pride in by study and argument determining the different questions for themselves, and then casting their votes accordingly, and we really believe that they made as good on the matters as would have a houseful of legislators who had other wiles to pull and much time for study. Suffrage is still in doubt, the road bills were snowed under, as was the one to abolish capital punishment. Single tax was defeated, and probably the mileage bills for the colleges, also the county division bills and those creating new offices and appropriations.

County Ticket

There is no kick coming from the Democratic forces in the result of the election as far as the county officers are concerned, they having captured a majority of the ticket. Besides sending the county for both Wilson and Lane, the voters defeated single tax, and voted on the rest of the amendments about as the Itemizer expressed its preference last week. Returns were so slow coming in yesterday, owing to the length of time that it took to count the ballots, that several officers were in doubt until last night, and there may yet be changes in the official count, which was begun this afternoon by Clerk Smith, Justices Holman and Wilson, and which will probably take until tomorrow night to complete. From the incompleteness of returns received to date it would only jumble up matters to now attempt to give any figures on the question, and we will leave them until next week until the official count has been made, and there is a certainty as to the vote received, and not a lot of guess work and incomplete figures as the thing stands now. We have the four Dallas precincts complete, and about a half dozen others nearly so, but as the result was oftentimes effected by other precincts it would not help matters to now publish them. Brunk, Hill, Seymour, Grant, Teal, Wells, Suver are in good majorities, not like those of the old days when the republicans could nearly run things to suit themselves, but good enough to insure their election. Smith concedes Robinson's election by about 30, and Meyers is there by a small majority of say half a dozen unless the official count changes it. Taken all in all, everybody, nearly, is satisfied, and we will now all pull together for a better and more prosperous Polk county, letting any animosities that may have been created during the heat of the campaign slide away to the back ground, forgotten and forgiven as such things should be aware we to be a prosperous and thriving community.
