CHET. ROWELL DEAD.

Meets Death at His Work as Civil Engineer on Grays River.

Last Thursday we chronicled the fact that Chester Rowell had been up to spend Christmas with his relatives here, and this week we are compelled to chronicle his death while at his work as surveyor on Grays River, Wash.

He was in the employ of John Van Orsdel, another Dallas raised boy, who has become noted as a civil engineer, and who has carried through numerous contracts in that line in Oregon and Washington.

Chet was John's right hand man and foreman, holding a responsible position, one of great trust, and one in which he took great pride and made good. It seems they were engaged in a camp on Grays River, which is across the river from Astoria, Monday morning they took the locomotive from the camp to the river after a new crew that was coming to work. On the way down the engine ran into a newly made fill and was turned over. The engineer of the train was unhurt, but Dole Fomeroy, an independence boy, was badly scalded, and Chet seriously so. They were taken on to the hospital at Astoria, where Chet succumbed to his fearful burns at 2 o'clock that afternoon.

Notice was received in Dallas that evening of his death, but that their choice would be Dr. Caldwell next morning, and it was not until Wednesday that authentic notice of the death was received. Tuesday F. J. Coad and Mrs. Chet Coad, and Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Stockwell went to Portland, where the remains were received and brought to Dallas Wednesday morning, rest at Chapman's undertaking parlors until Thursday morning, when they were taken to the residence of C. G. Coad, where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. D. L. Fields, of the Methodist church, and interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery under the auspices of the local Knights of Pythias, of which deceased was a charter member. The pallbearers were: Leif Finseth, Art Hayes, Ed Richmond, C. L. Crider, George Morton and J. R. Sibley.

Chester Frank Rowell was born in Dallas September 20, 1884, he being the only son of Thomas and Maggie Rowell. His mother died in 1889, when he was but five years of age and his sister, Ethel, 3. Most of his life has been spent in Dallas, where he received his education and learned his vocation. He was a young man of excellent habits, good moral character, of superior attainments, whose honesty and integrity could not be questioned, and who, had not his life career been so ruthlessly sundered at the beginning of his career, would have reached a high round in his chosen profession.

He leaves to mourn him besides his many boyhood friends his father, T. B. Rowell, of Penewawa, Wash., a sister, Mrs. J. A. Perry, of Sitka, Alaska, a half brother, George Rowell, of Penewawa, aunts, Mrs. J. B. Stump, of Monmouth, Mrs. A. V. R. Snyder, Mrs. C. G. Coad, and Mrs. V. P. Fiske; uncles F. J. Coad, C. G. Coad, G. R. Coad, Frank Rowell, of Toledo, Will Rowell, of Ricksdale, and many other more distant relatives.
