#### ANNUAL INSPECTION.

Regular Army Officer Finds Co. G. in Fine Shape.

Last night at the armory was a lively one for Company G, it being their first annual inspection since reorganization. Right here the Itemizer desires to enter a protest against the fact that but little interest seems to be taken in company maneuvers or drill by our citizens. The armory should have had a good sized crowd present last evening to watch the company show off before the authorized agent of the United States government. There were some spectators present, but nothing to such as the occasion warranted. Company G is drilling and perfecting itself in the manual art of protecting their home and fireside should occasion arise, and they stand ready and willing at all times to go forth and battle for our interests as patriotic residents of Oregon. The company is composed of the flower of our young manhood, the best Dallas has to give, and every citizen should give them encouragement in the performance of this duty by being present at their drills occasionally and noting the progress made.

Lieutenant F. C. Endicott, of the Fifth infantry, delegated by the government to inspect and perfect the militia organization of Oregon, was here for the purpose of inspecting the company, seeing that their guns and accoutrements were in first class condition, and they were well drilled in the manual of arms and necessary movements to be executed by a company of soldiers. He was accompanied by Major F. W. Settlement, of Woodburn, who came to inspect the stores and other paraphernalia belonging to the state of Oregon.

Captain Stafrin lined up his company of 45 men at 8:45, and a thorough inspection of their arms was made by Lieutenant Endicott, he personally examining each man's piece, seeing that it was in good working order, and giving instruction where needed. Arms were then stacked, each man's roll opened and laid out by him, and the men adjudged of their facility in getting ready for the march. This was a novelty to many spectators, showing just how the boys conduct themselves when out on actual service. An hour's drill of all kinds of formations was then indulged in by the army officer, giving advice and instruction when needed, it being near midnight before the before the men were turned loose and the annual inspection over.

Major Settlement addressed the company and was profuse with his praise for the showing they were able to make, after such a short time for drill, after reorganization. The company is composed of as fine a body of men as you could secure in any town, and the personnel of the company is away beyond the ordinary compliment for his zeal in rehabilitating the company and bringing it to the near perfection it has already attained. We should all feel proud of Company G and the praise it has been able to secure by hard work and the individual desire to be the best company in the state.

#### Mr. Starbuck Dead.

Elisha Starbuck, who has so long laid an invalid at the Starbuck home in Dallas, passed away last Saturday night aged 94 years. Rev. H. John Vine conducted the funeral services from the Chapman undertaking parlors Sunday afternoon, and the remains were taken to Portland Monday for interment. Deceased was born in Ohio in September 29, 1818. In 1842 he married Miss Polly A. Houghy, H. Starbuck, of Dallas. Mrs. Starbuck died in 1880, and the next year he married Miss Susan Pearson, of Indiana, where they lived four years, moving thence to Iowa, and across the plains in 1883. The family located near Spring Valley, and he lived there until 1903, when he moved to Portland, where his second wife passed away in 1909, since which he has lived with his son in Dallas, he having been confined to his bed on account of an accident in 1907. To the second marriage were born six children, five of whom are living. Mrs. Polly Frizzell, of Portland; Mrs. Clara McCamey, of Independence; Mrs. Laura Ruble, of Centralia, Wash.; Claud Starbuck, of California, and F. E. Starbuck, of Portland.
