DEFINITELY SETTLED.

Attorney General Crawford Rules on Qualification of Voters.

February 21, 1913

Editor Itemizer:

In the last issue of your valued paper you state that women will not have to register for the coming city election. This assertion is somewhat in conflict with section 8 of our city charter reading as follows:

"No person is qualified to vote at any election under this act who is not entitled to the privilege of an elector according to the laws of the state, and who has not resided in the city of Dallas for the three months last preceding such election and in the ward in he offers to vote for the ten days last preceding such election."

The registration books by which one becomes a voter in this state, not being open at this time, raises the point of how women must proceed to become entitled to vote at the coming city election. Please investigate and publish your findings in this matter.

Editor Itemizer:

I have your favor of the 24th instant asking as to the qualification of voters of your city, and answering you to say that the Supreme court in the case of Livesley against Litchfield, 47 Oregon 248, has decided that the qualifications of voters provided in section 2 of article 11 of the Constitution of Oregon, apply to all municipal elections as well as all state and county elections, and that those qualifications can neither be added to nor taken from by any law that may be passed, and this applies both to laws enacted by the legislature, or by city charter or ordinance. Therefore it is immaterial as to the size of the city; the qualifications of voters are the same in all cities; that is, they must be citizens of twenty-one years of age, resident within the city at the time they offer to vote, have resided in the state six months previous, or if not citizens, have declared their intention to become citizens at least one year prior to the election, and have resided in the state for six months next preceding. The Supreme court has also held in the case of Ladd against Holmes 40 Oregon 167, that registration of voters may be required by statute as a regulation of elections, but cannot be required as a qualifications of voters. Therefore your city charter of your city requires that all electors shall have the qualifications of voters at general elections, that does not include registration since registration is not a qualification under the Constitution. You state the city makes no provision for registration; it is immaterial, for the purpose of such elections, whether he is registered with the county clerk or not, inasmuch as that registration is not available for city purposes. It consequently follows, that the newly enfranchised voters are exactly the same position, and all who possess the qualifications mentioned in section 2 of Article 11 of the Constitution and enumerated above, are entitled to vote without reference to whether they have ever registered or not.

MAN'S WONDERFUL ACHIEVEMENTS

Pastor Russell Delivers Addresses at Panama and Colon.

The Marvels of the Canal—Intellect at Work—Steam, Electricity, Machinery, the Slaves of the New Order—Future Glories Anticipated—Mar, the King of Earth, to Be Reinstated—His Recovery From Sin and Death Guaranteed at Calvary—The Next Ten Centuries Will Be Marvelous.

Panama—Colon, February 23—Pastor Russell manifested a keen interest in the great Panama Canal work, which is speeding to completion. He took for his text Psalm 84, "WHAT IS MAN?" He rehearsed human engineering feats of the past—the Tower of Babel, the great city of Babylon, the Great Pyramid of Egypt, full of scientific accuracy and symbols of heavenly things. Solomon the Temple and Herod's, the Cathedral of St. Peter's at Rome, and other great cathedrals, each wonderful in its way, were referred to as examples of man's skill in the past.

All these stately edifices, the Pastor declared, glorify man's intellectual power not less than do some of the legal statutes of the past—the Mosaic Law, the Laws of Lycurgus, etc. These achievements refute the thought that our forefathers were monkeys.

Within the last half-century, human intelligence has bounded forward in a most remarkable manner. The telephone, the telegraph, the wireless, steam power, electric power and light have given talents a wider scope than ever before. They have forwarded the art of printing, which, in turn, has stimulated education. World-wide intelligence is making the world fabulously rich. Millions are on the alert to associate themselves with the new things and the resulting prosperity.

The Canal Illustrates All This. Modern cities, with their multiplied conveniences, our tunnels, or subways, under cities, and all for which they stand, amaze us. As we realize that these things have come within fifty years, we repeat "What is Man?" How wonderful is the intelligence which has been able to grapple with nature, its laws, etc., and master them! Is not man a great king in all the earth?

Nowhere is man's power to deal with earthly conditions more strikingly manifested than on this Canal Zone. We have here an illustration of mountain-moving faith. Six tons of Trojan powder exploded at one instant, crumbling an entire hill, is certainly a wonderful record. These great steam tunnels, which move enormous masses of loosened earth are marvelous. If only a few years ago, some one had told us that a man, by moving a lever, could lift six tons of earth, transport it an eighth of a mile, and load it upon cars all in three minutes or less, we would have thought him insane.
