Polk Loses Another of its Pioneer Women.

Mrs. G. J. Baskett passed away at the H. C. Fox home on the old Baskett place near Rickard yesterday, aged 84 years, after an illness of several months during which she was confined to her bed. Her death was caused by the troubles incident to old age, but she had long been a most patient sufferer from neuralgia. The funeral will occur from the home at 10 o'clock, Rev. E. Ritt, of Salem, officiating. She had long been a member of the Christian church and her example as a patient Christian woman was an example of all that is good in life.

Katherine S. Bristow was born in Illinois September 21, 1823. Her father came to Oregon in 1846, and she came with her mother and the other children in 1848. In 1850 she married C. J. Baskett, and they took up donation claims, on which she has lived nearly continuously for 63 years. Mr. Baskett passed away in 1883. Eight children were born to the union, only two of whom now survive, Mrs. H. C. Fox, of Rickard, and G. L. Baskett, of Elk City, Idaho. There are five grand children and one great grandchild, also a brother in Illinois.

SAM SMITH GONE.

Passes Away at Smithfield Home Wednesday Morning.

Although not unexpected, the notice of the death of Samuel T. Smith at his Smithfield home yesterday was quite a shock to his many friends in Dallas who have known him for many years.

Mr. Smith had been in poor health for a number of years caused by cancer of the stomach. Several months ago an operation was performed at the hospital to see if anything could be done to remedy his ailment, but it was found impossible, and although he recuperated from the operation sufficiently to return home, and once in a while make the journey to town, it was known that his demise was only a matter of time, in fact he lasted much longer than was expected. He died in the old home in which he was born on October 12, 1851, and had lived there all his life. He married Miss Rosa Smith, who with eight children are left to mourn him. The children are, Norma, Elsie, Perry, Harold, Glandon, Margaret, Esta and Evelyn. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. M. J. Hubbard and Mrs. Emily Byerley. There are also numerous other relatives in Polk county of not quite so close connection.

Sam Smith was the owner of considerable land, acquired by frugality, and was as well known as any man in the county. He had not a taste for public life, preferring the farm and its pleasures. The funeral will occur from the residence Friday morning, and the remains be laid to rest in the Brown cemetery. Rev. John Osborne, of Independence, being the officiating minister. Tried before School Supt.

Supt. H. C. Seymour presided as judge and jury in a hearing held before him Wednesday forenoon in the circuit court room at the court house.
