According to our new law registration of voters will begin on June 4th, and continue right along as needed, except 30 days prior to election. This registration will be final, going away with registration for each election, which will not again be necessary unless the voter makes a change of residence. At time of registration three cards will be used, conveying the voters status as a voter, one to be kept on file with the county clerk, one to be filed with each precinct election officer, of which there will be one in each precinct, and one will be given the voter himself, for presentation at the polls.

NEW MACHINERY.

Coad Planing Mill Puts in Machine for Square Holes.

The Coad planing mill, always up-to-date in the very latest machinery, has recently purchased and installed at a cost of \$250, what is known as a hollow bitted mortiser, it coming from Rockford, Illinois. It is really a bit that bores a square hole, and is practically invaluable for sash and door work, the mortises being turned out nicely clean cut and of any size or depth in very short order. There is not another machine of this latest improved pattern on the coast, and our factory can now turn out this kind of work about three times as fast as it could before.

One of the latest improved jointing machines has also recently been added to the tools of the planing mill at a cost of \$180, it being equipped with a round head instead of the former square ones, and will further add to the facility for getting out sashes and doors.

Two beautiful pieces of work we noticed just completed there, were a couple of duet stools for piano use, made of finely grained Oregon fir, and highly polished.

One of them has been ordered for West Virginia, and the other is for sale.

That arrangements for oiling had better be made, as our street will be getting fearfully dusty ere long.

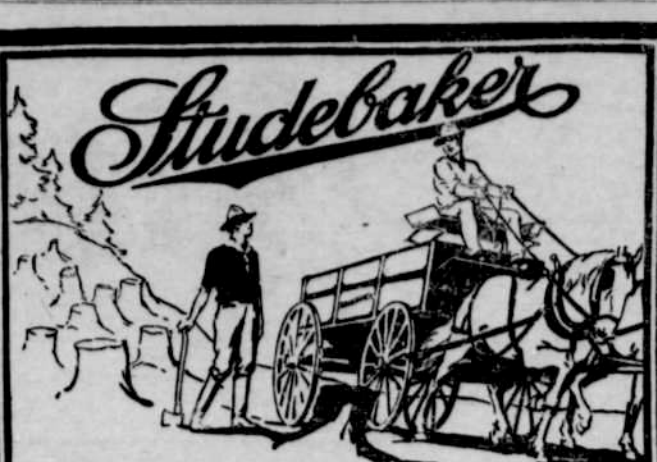
That it was a democratic victory anyhow.
