HARD SURFACING.

All Bids Rejected Except of Clark-Henry People.

As an evidence of the interest our citizens are taking in the matter of hard surfacing nine of our city blocks, the council chamber was crowded Monday evening to hear the bids read. There were eight bidders in all, and put in 15 propositions in four classes of pavement. The matter could not be attended to in any one night, and the council adjourned to meet Tuesday evening to further consider the question, and invited the councilmen elect, who will meet with them on May 5th, to meet with them and give of their advice. This was done in executive session, whatever that is. Engineer Flagg had prepared a carefully gotten up statement of bids received, and each councilman presented with one. He also explained in a scientific manner the different kinds of pavement presented, how prepared, their constituents, and probable wearing ability. The to be councilmen expressed themselves as in favor of hard surface, provided it was desired by the property owners, and could be gotten at right prices.

After discussion of the matter until nearly 11 o'clock, it was decided to throw out all bids except two of these put in by the Clark-Henry people, and return the deposit checks to the other bidders. A committee of three was then appointed by Mayor Craven to take these two bids, and visit all property owners interested as to their wishes on which bid they would prefer to accept. The committee is Barbur, Fenton and Flagg, and they are to report at an adjourned meeting of the council next Friday night.

On motion Staats the second quarter's payment of library funds was ordered drawn.

On motion of Staats the deeds for vacation of streets in the Howe addition were ordered prepared by Campbell and Flagg and sent to the Howe heirs for signature.

The matter of street sprinkling was brought up by Mayor Craven and ordered left to the street committee to interview Mr. Coulter regarding price and report Friday evening.

On motion of Fenton the ordinance committee was instructed to bring in an ordinance, licensing all tent exhibitions, so as to cover circuses not equipped with rings.

The Itemizer's course regarding hard surface pavement is just as we have stated: We are most emphatically in favor of it, providing the majority of the property owners effected desire to at this time stand the expense, and that the best kind of pavement is used. We are not in favor of a near product, but think that it should be of some material that has been tried out and not found wanting in any particular. Before any pavement is laid new water pipes should be put down and storm sewers installed. We believe the action of our old council in sending a committee to investigate pavements in different cities was a wise one, and money well spent. We thus got our knowledge from the people who had used the pavement and had no interest in any, except securing the best possible. The asking for bids at this time was also a good idea. We have received cheaper bids than any other time of year, as all contractors are now a little hungry, and do not know just how much they will have to do during the summer. Even if no paving should be done this year, we now have things down to a fine point, with neatly tabulated statements for future use of all bids received, and the first cost of all such work already done.

The matter is now up to the property owners along the nine blocks contemplated, and will be up for definite settlement tomorrow evening. City Engineer Flagg has prepared a statement of the cost on each street effected, as follows:

Proposition 1 is for a 4-inch concrete base and 2-inch asphaltic concrete wearing surface, and will cost \$1.44 a square yard. This per foot front on Main street would be \$4.48 or \$263.80 for each 60 feet; on Court and Mill streets \$4.80 a front foot, or \$288 for each 60 feet; on Oak street \$4.08 a front foot or \$244.80 for 60 feet.

Proposition No. 2 is an old macadam base with 2-inch wearing surface of asphaltic concrete, and the cost \$1.13 a square yard. On Main street it will cost \$3.50 a front foot or

\$216.60 per 60 feet; on Court and Mill \$3.77 a front foot or \$223.20 for 60 feet; on Oak \$3.20 a front foot, or \$192 for 60 feet.

The total cost per square yard as used for computing the front foot rates is for the pavement complete, including all necessary grading to put the street in shape to lay the pavement. The cost of concrete curbs, wherever they are required, is not merged in that rate. Under the terms of their bid, the Clark & Henry Construction Co. will lay straight concrete curb at 30 cents per lineal foot, and curb and extensions at 45 cents per lineal foot. The total cost of the improvement under proposition No. 1 is \$32,056.68, and under proposition No. 2 the total cost is \$25,176.10.
