EXPIRES SUDDENLY.

C. P. Bevins Passes Away on Road to the Hospital at Dallas.

While stopping at the home of Link Allen in Kings Valley Tuesday C. P. Bevins, of Airle, became badly off with an obstruction of the bowels and Dr. Bolman was sent for. Arriving there he found that he could do nothing for the suffering patient unless taken to the hospital. He proffered his auto for the purpose, and the party started for Dallas, Mr. Bevins reclining in the arms of his twin brother, Cricket.

Nothing serious was apprehended, but when within about three miles of Dallas at 9 o'clock Tuesday evening, the patient suddenly breathed his last. The auto was stopped, and efforts at resuscitation made, but they were of no avail. The body was brought on to Dallas, and prepared for burial, which will occur from his home at Elk City at 11 o'clock Friday morning.

C. P. Bevins was born at the farm home at Airle on May 5, 1859, and most of his boyhood days were spent in this county. Of late years he has been a resident of Lincoln county, where he owned a farm near Elk City. He leaves three children, Mrs. Etta Elkins, of Independence, and two younger ones at the farm home. He also leaves four brothers and two sisters: T. P. and T. O., of Airle; J. D., city marshal of Dallas, and E. D., of Corvallis; Mrs. Fannie Holman, of Dallas, and Mrs. M. W. Simpson, of Elk City. Deceased was familiarly known by the nickname of "Luge," and was a man loved and respected by all who knew him for his many excellent qualities and his joyful temperament. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. and his many friends in Polk county will most sincerely regret the passing of a good man.
