The cause of her death was in terminal fever. The body has been lying at the Chapman undertaking parlors, awaiting the arrival of her only daughter, Mrs. Kate Morrison, who resides at Klamath Falls, and interment occurred from the Baptist church this morning.

Electa Osborn was born in Illinois in 1836, and crossed the plains with her parents in 1849. She was married to Cornelius Hughes in 1869, and has since been a resident of Dallas, he being the pioneer shoemaker of our town. Two children, John and Kate, were the result of the union, the former passing away several years ago. Besides her aged husband, and daughter, she leaves one brother, Rev. J. W. Osborn, of Independence, and five grandchildren. A consistent and faithful member of the Baptist church, Mrs. Hughes' life has been a shining example to those desirous of an assured hereafter, and she goes to her reward with many aching hearts left behind.

Osteopaths Win in Arizona and New Jersey.

Quoted from Tucson, Ariz., Citizen. "The much-talked-of medical bill has at last passed the legislature and has become a law by the signature of the governor.

Under the new law osteopaths are given proper recognition." Another quotation from the Elizabeth, N. J. Journal. "It is a matter of profound satisfaction and relief—and we might add, for congratulation—that the long protracted fight for and against legalization and protection of the practice of osteopathy in this state is at an end; and while it may not have been settled to the entire satisfaction of the two chief parties engaged in the annual contest for the past ten years, the interest of the people has been undoubtedly safeguarded in the passage of Senate bill 48, which has just become a law by the approval of the governor. The apparent motive for the bill was, chiefly, to advance the standard of education and qualification and to remove the so-called fakirs from operation in the state.

"Thus it will be seen that, barring the practice of surgery, the practitioners of Osteopathy are established as physicians and are given the right to testify in courts and otherwise enjoy a legal status that the situation heretofore denied this worthy school of practice that has by its achievements based on high standards of education and ideals—made a place as an independent school of medicine; and when it is considered that within the brief period of twenty years this practice has developed from one practitioner—the founder—until now there are more than 6,000 practitioners—regular graduates from recognized colleges of Osteopathy—scattered throughout the world, and that it now supports a number of colleges where all subjects taught in regular medical schools are studied, except Materia Medica; that it has gained legal recognition in forty states and territories of the United States, it cannot longer be denied that it is a distinct system, worthy of all its accomplishments and entitled to the place it has made in the field of medicine.

"It is to be hoped that evidences of jealousy and prejudice will soon disappear and that the osteopathic doctors may at no distant day be accorded recognition in the hospitals and other institutions under control of the dominating school of practice, just as was reluctantly accepted the Homeopaths and Eclectics. Narrowness and bigotry should be abandoned and we believe will be."

Special Circuit Court.

Judge Galloway came over Monday to hold a special term of circuit court, and as far as possible represent his district for his successor in this county, Webb Holmes. The principal case was the injunction suit filed by W. J. Coy against the city of Dallas in the matter of issuing a third saloon license. John Carson, Oscar Hayter and W. L. FATHER ELKINS CELEBRATES.

He is Probably Oldest Man Now Resident of Polk.

J. E. Elkins, of Independence, celebrated the 91st anniversary of his birth Monday. He was born in Culpepper county, Virginia, in 1822, and comes of a prominent family, ex-Senator Elkins of West Virginia, being a distant relative. He joined the train and crossed the plains driving a team of oxen for the privilege of going. In November 1845 he arrived in Oregon and in May 1846 came to Polk county and took up a donation land claim. In 1849 he went to California to work in the mines but not being satisfied at that work he returned to Oregon in 1850. He married Lucy J. Zumwalt in May 1851, and they settled on a claim in the Luckiamute Valley. Mr. Elkins was a successful farmer and lived on the same place for 40 years. Six children were born to the couple, two sons and three daughters still living.

"Father Elkins," as he is called, has resided in Independence for 25 years, and is able even at this very advanced age to walk about actively. The Elkins school in Luckiamute Valley was named in his honor.
