A NEW METHOD

Of Dry Cleaning Installed By En-
terprising Firm of Williams
& Collins.

In our rounds yesterday we noticed a gasoline engine chugging merrily along in the rear of the well known and popular tailoring establishment of Williams & Collins, and went in to inquire the cause and satisfy our curiosity. Mr. Otto Williams showed us a newly constructed rear room in which his firm have installed the machinery for the very latest in what is known as dry cleaning of all kinds of garments. A gasoline engine furnishes the motive power for the running of the two necessary machines. The first is a large cylinder, which will hold 10 gallons of gasoline, and in which can be placed as many as four suits of clothes at one time, or any other garments of like bulk. Other cleaning ingredients are added, and the whole rapidly revolved until perfectly cleansed, when the garments are removed and placed in the extractor, another circular concern, which entirely removes from them all the gasoline taint, and brings them forth looking as spick and span as new garments, and ready for pressing. An object lesson was given us in a suit of clothes thickly covered with oil and grime, and which came out looking as if just from the tailor. It makes no difference how dirty your clothes may be, as this process will thoroughly clean them, and the texture of the garment cuts no ice, as there is nothing in the process to injure the finest fabric. This is something new in the cleaning line, and the only plant of the kind in the city possessing its capabilities.

It was decided to allot \$1500 for premiums, \$1000 to be given for the adult exhibits and \$500 for those of the children.

The Loyal Order of Moose perfected arrangements last evening to send a large delegation on a special train to Dallas on Thursday evening, July 24, for the purpose of attending a house warming of the Moose lodge of that city.
