MRS. DORA INGLE KILLED.

Former Dallas Girl Victim of Jealous Husband.

Crazed by jealousy on account of domestic troubles, Fred W. Ingle, of Corvallis, placed the muzzle of a .38 revolver to the head of his wife, Dora D. Ingle, yesterday in the library of Carver & Brown in the National bank building about 4.30 o'clock and sent two bullets crashing through her brain, killing her instantly. He then turned the smoking revolver on himself and sent a third into his own head inflicting a mortal wound and dying about 5.30. He lived scarcely an hour after the shooting. He leaves a sister, Mrs. Holm, in Wenatchee, Wash., and three brothers. All the more horrible was the work of the fiend when it had become known that he had vowed he would "get" his wife and "kill her on sight." Two weeks ago, just before Mrs. Ingle was in Woodburn, Alpheus Engle, Woodburn's city marshal, according to a statement of Wm. Wegnerorth, of that city, received word that Fred Ingle was going to "kill her on sight." It was reported that Ingle had been involved in some financial difficulty with the express company at Woodburn and that he had been held responsible for the disappearance of \$500 from the company's funds. It was said that he was let out of his position there. Brooding over this affair and his domestic troubles are said to have wrought upon his mind until he became distracted. Five people were in the office at the time of the tragedy. They were Fred W. Ingle, Dora D. Ingle, Renska Swart, Attorney McFadden, of Corvallis, and J. D. Turner. Just previous to the shooting Mr. Turner, attorney for Mrs. Ingle, and Judge McFadden, attorney for Ingle, were in the library trying to effect a reconciliation between the husband and wife. The two attorneys stepped into Turner's private office and left the three alone. Scarcely two minutes had elapsed when two shots were heard, followed by a woman's screams. The two men rushed into the library and found Fred and Dora Ingle in the far end of the room, dying in each other's blood. Mrs. Ingle had two bullet wounds on the left side of her head. One bullet pierced the lobe of the ear and entered the head immediately below the oral cavity. The second bullet tore through the brain at a point an inch above the ear. It went clear through the head and lodged beneath the skin on the right side. Ingle shot himself in the forehead. The above is taken from the Salem Statesman of this morning and first notice of the terrible tragedy was given Dallas people on the Itemizer's bulletin board half an hour after the occurrence yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Ingle was formerly Miss Dora Brady, who with her widowed mother was once a resident of Dallas. Mrs. Ingle is a younger sister of Mrs. Claud Dunn, and was known as one of the handsomest girls of our city, being also noted as a sweet singer. She had been visiting her sister here lately, and her death was a great surprise to her many Dallas friends. Mr. and Mrs. Claud Dunn went to Salem yesterday evening, and interment will take place at her mother's home in Woodburn. Her mother, three brothers and one sister survive. The brothers are David Bradley and Herbert Bradley, connected with Portland theatres, and George Bradley, of Chicago. Mrs. Claud Dunn, of Dallas, is the sister. Ingle was a man of some 36 years of age, and the couple had been married about 10 years. Not Yet Too Late. It is not yet too late to spray for Codlin moth.
