**MEETING OF DIRECTORS.**  
 Woman's Club Elect New Secretary and Transact Other Business.  
 At the residence of a president, Mrs. J. R. Craven, the meeting of the board of directors of the Woman's club was held last Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of acting upon a request of the Associated charities of Portland in regard to the placing of 25 children among country homes near here for a visit of from ten days to two weeks. The charities began the movement to give the poor children of Portland an outing, a taste of fresh country air, and a change of environment. Money was raised from charitable inclined persons, by means of the press, to pay the transportation, and now it is requested of the country people to act as entertainers for one, two or three of them, as families may feel inclined. Silverton was the first town to entertain a crowd of them, and the results were so beneficial to the children, that many other towns have volunteered to care for a class of total. The woman's club has taken no direct action and cannot do so until they know if our people are willing to act as hosts. A committee consisting of Mrs. Conrad Staffin, Mrs. J. E. Miller, and Mrs. L. D. Brown were appointed to solicit temporary homes for ten days, and they are now at work to see how many can be accommodated. The committee will esteem it a great favor if any who can give a child or two a nice country outing will communicate with them, in order that they may know as soon as possible. No fear of disease may be entertained, as the children are all examined before leaving Portland. Life on a farm is nearly the greatest joy that can come to childhood; if you can help to make only one little fellow enjoy such a vacation your mite is being paid toward the great human debt of following the golden rule.  
 Having moved to Portland, Mrs. E. M. Smith tendered her resignation as secretary of the Woman's club, and Mrs. Harry Woods was elected to the vacancy.
