having a large practice.

James Jenkins was here from
Washington territory for a visit
with his sister, Mrs. Henry
Howe.

Sheriff Groves had many of
his hop poles prostrated by the
hard wind of the previous Sat-
urday.

W. W. Miller was quite ill
with bilious fever.

A. S. Crider and wife left for
a trip through the middle west.

Dr. I. T. Mason had a calf
with only three legs.

D. J. Riley and a force of car-
penters left Dallas to put up a
fine residence for Hon. A. M.
Holmes near Bethel.

John E. Smith was the proud
father of a son who was claimed
to be the fattest little rascal in
the county. He was 4 years old,
and weighed 72-12 pounds.

Samuel Orr was the proud
father of a 12-pound son, born
in Salem.

Rube Glaze had a watch stolen
from him at Salem by Fred Van
Wagner.

Hon. N. L. Butler was back
from Yaquina and said he left
Dave Sears there climbing trees
after rock oysters.

Will H. Parry was reported
to have lost the use of both his
eyes.

A hotel was one of the things
badly needed in Dallas.

Jim Tetherow's boys was re-
ported as bleeding to death from
a cut finger, the doctors being
unable to stop the flow.

It was said that if the narrow
gauge management got much
worse the trains would become
try weeklies—go to Portland one
week and try to get back the
next.

Charley Frantz had a narrow
escape from death at their mill
in Kings Valley.

Gene Hayter and Mark Ellis
caught 182 trout up the Luckia-
mute, some of them being 15 in-
ches long.

P. W. Ellis assumed charge of
the newly installed telegraph of-
fice at Monmouth.

L. B. Martin went into his
barn at his saw mill six miles
from Dallas one night, and the
lamp, which he was carrying ex-
ploded, resulting in a fire that
consumed all his hay and several
oxen.

Apriarist Ships 125 Cases.

That the bee business in Mon-
mouth pays has been demon-
strated by W. J. Miller, who re-
cently shipped 125 cases of honey,
making a total of about 3200
pounds in the shipment. The
price received was between \$3
and \$4 a crate. Mr. Miller has
an apiary of nearly 100 hives.

The bees are of the Black and
Italian and obtain some honey
from the red clover. Several
years ago W. L. Arant west of
that city, sold several crates of
red clover honey made by Italian
bees to a Portland commission
merchant for \$5 a crate. This
is the highest price yet recorded
for clover honey.

For clover honey, the growers
have been wanting better
prices to settle in that section of
the country, and have offered
small tracts of their land, in or-
der that the clover crop might be
benefited by the pollenization by
the bees.—Journal.

Fine Dairy Barn on McArthur Farm.

One of the finest and largest
dairy barns in Polk county is be-
ing erected on the McArthur
ranch, two miles east of Rick-
erall. It is to have a cement floor
and all sanitary conveniences.

A milk cooling plant and separa-
tor house will be added, and
steam cleaning and sterilizing
outfits will also be continued.

The owner of the ranch is a
Portland attorney, but the ranch
is under the management of G.
E. Rowe. One by one new dairy
barns are rising in Polk county
and the dairy business is steadily
growing.—Oregonian.

THIRTY THOUSAND
INFANTS SAVED

Let the Good Work Continue!
Says Pastor Russell.

Presbyterians Lead in Theological
Progress—Will Not Other Denomi-
nations Co-operate—What Can Be
Done For the Non-elect and Non-
regenerate Infants of the Past?

Pastor Russell Not Able to Agree,
Although Sympathetic—His View of
the Matter as Outlined in the Bible.

London, August
3.—A Bible Stu-
dents Convention
has been in pro-
gress here for sev-
eral days in the
London Taber-
nacle, Lancaster
Gate, W. Pastor
Russell delivered
two addresses to-
day. We report
one of them, from
the text, "Else
were your chil-
dren unholy, but now are they holy."

1 Corinthians 7:14.

The Pastor declared his text was
probably the basis of much of the pre-
vailing confusion on the subject of in-
fant salvation and infant damnation.
Before discussing his text, he wished
to call attention to a very advanced
theological step recently taken by the
Presbyterian General Assembly in the
United States. According to telegraph-
ic dispatches, it had altered the Con-
fession of Faith so as to save non-elect
infants as well as elect ones.

The thought that God had arranged
a plan whereby some infants would
go to heaven at death, and other in-
fants to eternal torture, has for cen-
turies troubled the minds of all Chris-
tians—Catholic and Protestant. Some
said that elect infants would be saved,
and non-elect infants tortured. Others
held that baptized infants would be
saved, and other infants not baptized,
or sprinkled, would go to eternal tor-
ture. Others held that none could be
saved without regeneration; and these,
being perplexed as to how infants
could be regenerated, could hardly have
any hope of infant salvation. For cen-
turies good people have suffered terri-
bly because of these confused ideas.

The Pastor then showed how foolish
all these theories seem when confast-
ed with the simple and beautiful teach-
ing of Scripture that the salvation of
all—young and old, of heathen lands
as well as Christian—la through the
resurrection power of Messiah's King-
dom. He then said, Why should we
trouble long with the errors of the
Dark Ages when God's Word is now
shining so brightly?

Unable to Agree.

Pastor Russell declared that he felt
great sympathy for the move of the
Presbyterian brethren; but neverthe-
less, he could not agree with their con-
clusions, believing that the Bible
teaches otherwise. He realized that
the Presbyterian view of Election
made it difficult for them to deal with
the non-elect, both adults and infants.
He found Scriptures declaring that
God is selecting the Church from
amongst the world. He conceded that
those not elect would properly be called
non-elect. But he found nothing
in the Bible to indicate that non-
elects should be tortured. He declared
that to joint-helpers in Messiah's
Kingdom means predestination to an
eternity of torture.

Many have been consigning adults
and infants to the same eternal tor-
ture every day (30,000 infants daily), or 32,
000,000 every year, to eternal torture,
because non-elect, unregenerate or un-
baptized. Surely all intelligent people
are out of accord with such a propo-
sition. Surely some great mistake has
been made during the Dark Ages, and
God has been slandered.

The Pastor then demonstrated that
God is the very personification of Wis-
dom, Justice, Love and Power; where-
as a God who would foreordain 32,000,
000 beings per year to pass to an eter-
nity of torture would be, not a God,
but the most terrible devil imaginable.

Bible students are realizing that
the Bible teaches nothing of the kind we
once supposed. As their eyes of under-
standing open, they appreciate the
divine character as never before.

All Condemned Need Redemption.

After reminding his hearers that he
was speaking of the Bible as it is, and
not by being infants, the Pastor
showed conclusively from the Bible
that although infants share in Adam's
sin, and have provision in Jesus' re-
deemptive work, nevertheless
they can be saved only by coming to a
knowledge of God and Jesus, and then
exercising faith and obedience to the
strictest ability. His position seems
unshakable.

The speaker then reviewed the Bible
teaching that all mankind sinned in
Adam, and came under the Divine
curse, or sentence of death—not eter-
nal torment. "In the time Christ died
for the ungodly"—those who lived be-
fore His crucifixion and those born
since. Because of this general redemp-
tion, co-extensive with the curse, there
is to be a resurrection out of sin and
death conditions back to perfection of
life. Only those who intelligently re-
ject this grace of God will die the Sec-
ond Death.

Meantime, all—infants and adults—
die to go to Sheol, Hades, the tomb,
there to await the resurrection Morn-
ing—Messiah's Kingdom. Then the
dead shall come forth from the tomb—
"every man in his own order."

COUNCIL MEETING.

Many Matters Under Discussion
Pertaining to City's Welfare.

Council was called to order in
adjourned session Monday evening
by Mayor VanOrdel with all
the officers present except Council-
men Fenton, Gorkhe and Mc-
Bee.

A representative of a street
sweeping concern appeared be-
fore the council to recommend
his appliance. He advised that
as we had no storm sewers, a
flushing appliance would be in-
advisable; that he had a one man
concern that could be furnished
for \$30. He was referred to the
health and police committee, who
have been given power to act in
this matter.

Dr. Hayter asked for a war-
rant for \$57.80 on interest fund,
and one of \$200 on sewer bond
fund, and same was granted.

On motion of Sibley the hear-
ing of remonstrances against
proposed macadam street work
on that portion of Academy, be-
tween Church and Levens was
closed.

Bids were opened for the con-
struction of curbs on the above
improvement and were read from
Himes Bros. and Holmes & Grant.

The bids were referred on motion
of Hayter to the mayor, Barber
and Sibley with power to act and
enter into a contract with either
firm.

On motion of Sibley the street
committee was given power to
grade the upper end of Hayter
street and take down the hill.

Williams Installs Plant.

Finding out that it was at this
time not possible to interest local
capital in the installment of a
central heating plant, Ralph Wil-
iams has concluded to put the
same in personally. He will fur-
nish the three bank buildings
with steam heat from his plant
and stands ready to contract with
any other business house in the
three blocks or the free library
or Gail hotel at a price of 35
cents a foot radiation. This is
the same price as charged by the
McMinnville plant. The heat
will be ready for service by No-
vember 1st.

Dallas Boy Wins Honors.

Edward E. Boyd, who has pur-
chased an interest in the Holmes
Business college, and who has
become the dean of the faculty
and president of that institution,
is well known in school circles in
Hood River, where he was em-
ployed for six years. Mr. Boyd
was for two years principal of
the Hood River high school and
for four years was superintendent
of the schools of the city.

The new president of the Port-
land college was Hood River
county's first school superinten-
dent, having resigned the posi-
tion of superintendent of Santiam
Academy to come here to take up
educational work. He was edu-
cated at Dallas College and the
University of Oregon.—Oregon-
ian.
