Mr. Eastman says that several box cars were being pushed ahead of the engine, which rendered it difficult to see just what was coming. When he saw that it was too late to stop, he gave the engine the power and tried to beat the box cars to the crossings. He almost made it. The rear wheel of the motorcycle was struck and the rider hurled about fifty feet before coming to a halt.
