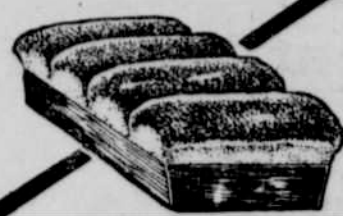

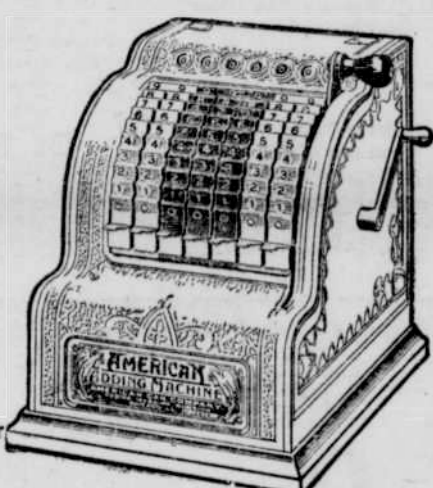

PROSECUTOR CONCURS.

Says Court has No Other Course But to Order Falls City Liqueur Election.

To the Honorable John B. Teal, County Judge for Polk County, Oregon.

Referring to your verbal inquiry of recent date as to the legality of a petition of voters of Falls City, Oregon, in which it is asked that your Honorable Court call an election for November 4, 1913, to determine whether the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be allowed within the corporate precincts of that city, I beg leave to advise that, after an examination of the law, I consider it mandatory upon you as County Judge to order that such an election be held.

In 1910 the people of the state passed the so-called "Home Rule Amendment," which, among other things, gives to cities and towns the exclusive power to regulate, suppress and in general control the sale of intoxicating liquors within the corporate limits of such municipalities. This power, vested by the constitutional amendment, is, however, subject to the provisions of the local option law, it is, therefore, necessary to turn to the local option law to determine the machinery of such elections as would be required to carry out what is intended in the "Home Rule Amendment."

Here we find that after a petition has been filed containing the requisite number of legal signatures that it is mandatory upon the County Court to order the election to be held. This, I take it, is all that the County Court desires to know in this regard. It is the only matter that can be pertinent at this time: Must the County Court call such an election?

To answer this query it must be determined what constitutes that which is known under the local option law as the County Court. Does the law refer to the County Judge and the two Commissioners, or merely to the County Judge?

In State vs. McElrath, 49 Or., 294, this very question is decided by the Oregon Supreme Court. It was upon this point that the case went to the higher tribunal and it was this point that was

settled in the controversy.

"In ordering an election under the local option law, and in declaring the result of such election, the County Court is not exercising any of its ordinary duties," says the Supreme Court. "It is not transacting probate business because that contemplates matters dealing with the settlement of the estates of deceased persons. It is not exercising criminal or civil jurisdiction because that assumes adverse parties and the determination of issues between them. It is not transacting county business because the duties imposed on it do not come within the provisions of the statutes defining what shall constitute county business. The county, as such, has no interest in the question whether an election under the local option law shall be held, nor is it in any way affected by the result. In the performance of the duty imposed on it by the local option law the county court is acting in a special capacity in the discharge of other powers and duties prescribed by law."

"And it is of no importance, as far as we can see, whether the duties thus imposed, which are largely, if not entirely ministerial, be discharged by the county court when presided over by the county judge alone, or when the county commissioners are sitting with him."

In the light of this decision and the constitution and the local option law, I can see wherein the county judge can do no other than to order this special election to be held. What may be contained in the charter of Falls City can in no manner impose any duty upon the County Judge or take any duty from him. He must follow the statutes of the state. If there are other considerations of municipal law they do not affect him. They are to be decided in a court of competent jurisdiction. All the County court can do is to abide by the statute as it applies to his particular and specific duties.

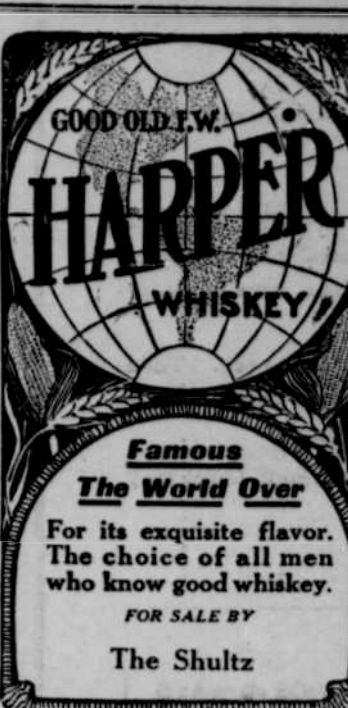
