Tracy Staats, county treasurer, reports that up to Wednesday night his office force had written receipts for \$245,000 and a little more, and that about \$30,000 more had been received, but had not yet been written up. As the total roll of the county is \$325,950, this leaves only about \$50,000 yet uncollected, and \$18,000 of that amount is on the O. & C. railroad lands, which the Southern Pacific company have declined to pay.

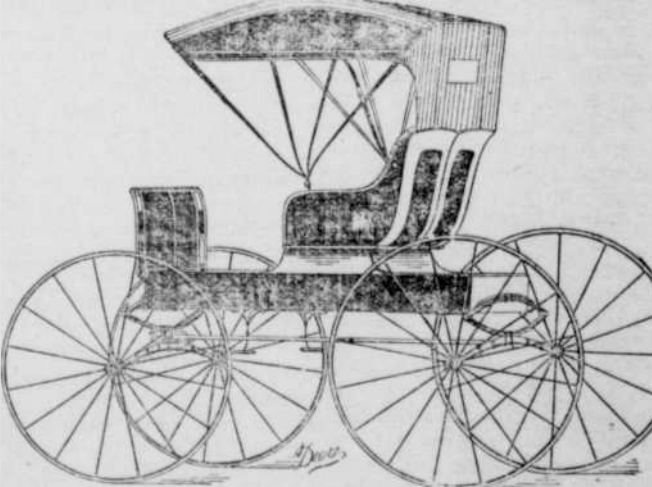
