THE POLITICAL OUTLOOK.

Before another issue of the Itemizer reaches its readers the great battle of primary ballots will have been fought and won and the issue decided as to who will be the candidates of the several parties for the November struggle. The primary election is fraught with more than usual interest. Both of the old parties have a goodly list of candidates out for the most important offices, and the contention between them verges on the spectacular, not a little acrimony being injected into the campaign. Charges and counter-charges are being made, fully proving the saying that when a man seeks office every mean thing he has done in his life-time will surely be brought up against him. If some of the charges brought can be substantiated by undeniable proof, a number of those who are running for office are unfit for the trust they ask the people to repose in them. At such times, however, such charges made must always be taken with a grain of salt, as oftentimes they are brought solely for the purpose of creating political disaster to the candidate and really have no foundation except in the brains of those who conceived them. The intelligent voter must at the polls settle these matters as best he can. He must differentiate between the true and the false, the good and the bad, and do his part in the selection of the best men to fill the offices that it is possible to secure. It is a well known fact that voters nowadays are not hanging to party lines as they did, nor can you always find the best man for a certain position as the candidate of any particular party. Of course, it is nearly certain that the best men will generally be found on the democratic ticket, but we have known even that staid, old, popular party to put up men of whom they were really ashamed.

Following our custom since the primary ballot was created, the Itemizer is not taking sides in next week's voting contest. We know nothing particularly wicked against any candidate on any ticket. As far as we know, any of them, on any of the tickets, could fill the offices to which they aspire with greater or less efficiency, as the case may be. Some would make efficient and obliging public servants, while others would get so puffed up by the honor conferred as to be hardly of any benefit to their constituents. The great state fight in both the old parties will be for governor and the result cannot be foretold by republican or democrat. There are other state offices for which there is a plenitude of aspirants, but the most interest will be taken in and the hardest battle fought for the executive office. In Polk county the democrats will have their biggest fight for sheriff and surveyor, while there will hardly be a scrambling by the republicans for any office. So far the campaign in this section has been a clean one, and we hope that it will so continue.

Who Hollister Is.

Fredrick Hollister, democratic candidate for congressman from the first Oregon district, is not a politician. He is a hard-headed business man, who has a habit of expressing his views bluntly; and because he has been successful in Oregon he wants to repay his debt to his state by representing it as he feels that Oregon ought to be represented in Washington. In Salem this week one of his friends asked him why he didn't "get in the prohibition band wagon like the rest of the candidates."

"I don't believe in getting into the band wagon to win votes," replied Hollister. "I believe in real prohibition, and I have pledged myself ever since I entered the campaign to work for that end. But sectional prohibition seems futile to me; I look upon it as a waste of energy. You can't build a dry island in an ocean of booze and then not expect the waves to overwhelm the shore. If prohibition is going to prohibit, it must be national in scope, and that's why I am for national prohibition and no compromise. Little dabs of prohibition here and there are not effective and simply put a premium on lawbreaking. I think if a thing is worth doing at all it is worth doing right."

LATEST PHYSIOLOGIC TREATMENT

POLYPUS AND GOITRE by means of ELECTRICITY as used by

DR. TOEL
The Chicago Specialist Now in DALLAS to Introduce His Methods.

Polypus is a growth having a stem. It may grow in the nose, in the throat, from the womb or inside of it, or in the rectum. In fact it may grow in any cavity of the body having an external outlet. When growing in the nose it interferes with breathing, often closing up one or both nostrils entirely. Dr. Toel has removed as many as 14 polypi from a single nostril. In many cases these polypi grow from a cleft in a diseased, carious, tuberculous bone in the nasal cavity.

The usual process is to cut them out with scissors, or catch them in a forceps and tear out polypus and bone at the same time, or to snare them off with a steel wire. The cutting and tearing operations are extremely bloody and have all the dangers of such operations, as possible blood poisoning, pain and a return of the growth. The steel wire snare operation is bloodless if very slowly performed, often taking from one to two hours, but the parts are crushed and the danger of blood poisoning is there.

Aside of this, the operation causes much pain in its long duration.

Polyp of the throat, womb and rectum are removed by the same means, having the same dangers and drawbacks as those for polyp of the nose.

The electrical operation as used by Dr. Toel is free of any loss of blood, there is none of very little pain, as all the blood vessels and lymphatic vessels are sealed up during the operation. There is no danger of blood poisoning and as the root from which the polypus grows is destroyed there is little danger of a return, and finally the operation can be performed in a few minutes while chloroform or ether are only necessary in the most severe cases.

Goitre is an enlargement of the thyroid gland lying in front of the windpipe. This growth is far more frequent in women than in men. It is very frequent in Western Oregon.

Its size often becomes very large, causing great trouble to the bearer. But its danger lies in its pressure on the windpipe, which softens the cartilage rings and finally compresses them so that the patient dies from asphyxiation. Especially dangerous is that form which extends below the breast bone, when slight congestion will often enlarge the goitre to such an extent that the patient dies before a surgeon can be called to open the windpipe and insert a silver tube to breathe through.

Treatment of goitre by medicines taken into the stomach as well as by salves applied locally has very little effect.

Removing the goitre with the knife is one of the bloodiest operations known to surgery, and if the entire goitre is removed causes a peculiar form of disease, which in a few years often kills the patient.

The electrical treatment of goitre as used by Dr. Toel is free from these dangers. There is no loss of blood, no danger

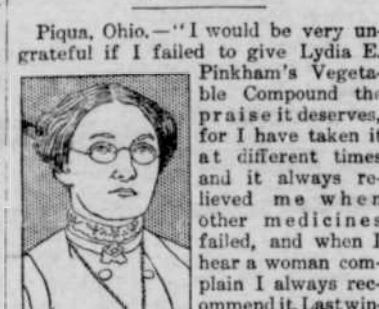
