

# An Everyday Cake

Here is a simple and inexpensive cake that can be varied in many ways with different frostings and icings. It looks a little like a cake in a tube pan, but will be equally as good baked in a square loaf.

## K C Gold Cake

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.  
1 cup butter; 1 cup sugar; yolks of 1 egg, beaten light; 1 cup flour, less 2 level tablespoonsful; 2 level teaspoonsful K C Baking Powder; 1/2 cup milk; grated rind of 1 orange.

Sift flour and baking powder together three times; cream butter and sugar, beat yolks of eggs, add these to creamed mixture, and lastly add the moisture and flour after sifting, beating batter until smooth. Cocunut Frosting
