COL. COMPTON, commander of the post at Walla Walla, will be the subject of a court of inquiry concerning the act of his soldiers at Walla Walla last week. If their murderous acts were permitted without due care to prevent such, he will be made to suffer.

It naturally occurs to one after a moment's thought, that the declaration of Col. Compton to the effect that he could not keep his soldiers at their quarters in Fort Walla Walla, when apprised of their intentions to mob Hunt, was an admission on his part of very poor discipline at the post. It will and should be investigated.

CALEF is the abbreviation adopted by the postal authorities to avoid mistakes in delivering mail addressed to California. And all mail addressed to parties there hereafter must have Calif., and not Cal., as this so reasonable the abbreviation for Colorado,—Col., that it is sometimes impossible to determine to which place the letter should be sent.

A man of soldiers took the town of Walla Walla last Friday night and shot to death a prisoner, one A. J. Hunt, a gambler, who was confined in the county jail at that place. The cause of this outrage, as stated on our third page, was the shooting Wednesday night of Private E. Miller, of Troop D, Fourth Cavalry, by Gambler A. J. Hunt. The soldiers made an unsuccessful effort Thursday night to lynch Hunt.

GOVERNOR PENNOYER is a standing disgrace to the state of Oregon. An appointing President Harrison's visit to this state he announces that he will not meet the chief executive at the state line, as becomes him in his position, but if the president wishes to see him, he will be found at Salem. In other words, Harrison must pay homage to Penoyer. This is a little of the latter's old, worn-out state right's doctrine, and he is receiving a just scoring from the newspapers all over the Union. Penoyer is not a Southern man, however, or he would be more hospitable.

The fact that Heppner's big \$40,000 hotel is unfinished and unoccupied, is doing the town a positive injury. Any one acquainted with the facts knows that a technical defect in the title of the lot on which the hotel is built has caused all the delay and trouble. As soon as this matter is settled, the hotel will not long remain unoccupied, as several applications are on file from parties desiring to lease the property. Yet the continuation of the plans of the hotel company should be hastened as rapidly as possible that the present conditions of matters shall not stand as a detriment to Heppner.

Ivanhoe is an old army officer, having held the position of major there, to which he worked up from the ranks. The Gazette regrets that Col. Ivanhoe should have forgotten his duty to the third regiment and the Oregon National Guard so far as to become the subject of a court-martial.
