

CLARENCE IS DEAD.

The Heir Presumptive Passes Away.

GRAVE HIS MARRIAGE BED.

The Mail News Causes Widespread Grief Throughout England—Prince George to Succeed to a Marriage to Be Arranged to Secure the Succession.

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Clarence is dead. LONDON, Jan. 14.—The Lord Mayor few minutes after 9 this morning received the following dispatch from the Prince of Wales announcing the death of the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, heir presumptive to the throne: "Our beloved son passed away at 9 o'clock today."

On receipt of the news the Lord Mayor at once gave orders to have the great bell in St. Paul's cathedral toll, and also sent the following message to the Prince of Wales: "We are profoundly moved by the sad news and have communicated it to our fellow citizens. We tender our deep and respectful sympathy with your royal highness in this great sorrow and national calamity."

The condition of Princess Mary is pitiable. She sits in her room in a state of weeping bitterness; she cannot be made to stay in one place for more than a few minutes together and she appears to be dazed at the sudden taking of her betrothed husband.

Up to noon no official bulletin of the death of the Duke was issued at Sandringham hall, but soon after 10 o'clock the blinds of the house were drawn. The flag on the church was placed at half mast and to that well-known tolling. These facts gave to the people waiting about the gates the first information that all was over.

At 1 o'clock this afternoon the following dispatch was received from three of the attending physicians at Sandringham: "After a marked improvement during the early part of the night the strength of the Duke suddenly failed. About 2 o'clock he began gradually to sink, and death occurred at 9:15 a. m."

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PRINCESS PROSTRATED

She Still Refuses to Touch Food.

"EDDIE, MY EDDIE," SHE CRIES.

The Princess of Wales Takes Her Son's Death Very Hard—Fears That She May Die—Exhausted by Watching at the Bedside.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Apprehension is felt in many quarters regarding the condition of the Princess of Wales who takes the death of her son very much to heart and refuses to be comforted.

The Princess Victoria Mary, whose poignant sorrow at the loss of her betrothed husband seems to increase, was also prostrated by the intensity of her grief and her refusal to touch food.

Much anxiety is expressed regarding her. Princess Mary stood beside her royal lover and was blind with tears watching him as his life ebbed away. When the doctors announced that the Duke was dead she became hysterical and her cries were heard rending.
