



The train mon soon liberated those unable to extricate themselves, but none were able to eave their clothes, and the night being the coldest of the season, the thermometer reaching 46 below, the suffering of the injured was terrible. At this time it was discovered that Mrs. Ed Andrews and Lillie were missing, but no human efforts could render them assistance, as the car was a mass of flames. They were burned to death.
