FIRE TIMBER.—Perhaps, the best timber growing in the Blue mountains can be found on Rock creek, in the vicinity of Will Mallory's saw-mill. This class of timber Mr. Mallory is using in making lumber which he is delivering in Heppner all the way from \$15 to \$30 per thousand feet, depending on the quality, and whether desired rough or dressed. The same can be bought at the mill at prices ranging from \$8 to \$25 per thousand. He has a general assortment on hand at present, and is sure to satisfy customers. 42-7f.

PRIMAIRIES IN HEPPNER.—Hepner precinct republicans met at the court house last Saturday afternoon, electing A. W. Patterson chairman of the meeting and Geo. Thornton secretary. S. P. Carrington, Geo. Conner, T. L. Howard, J. W. Adams, Jr., and Frank Gilham were selected as delegates. The meeting in Mount Vernon precinct was held at the engine house, with A. M. Gunn chairman and T. C. Ambrey secretary. F. J. Hallock, Stephen L. Leland, Dan Horner were elected delegates with one vote each and M. Beaman, T. E. Fell, W. P. Dutton and M. Lichtenfeld each a half vote. The meeting in Geary was held at the opera house, with S. N. Morgan as chairman and W. B. Potter secretary. J. W. Reator, S. N. Morgan, Johnny Elder, Jay Devins and W. B. Potter were chosen as delegates. Everything passed off harmoniously.

COST OF WAREHOUSES.—By the plans and specifications sent our county by Emory Oilier, of Portland, we learn that the actual cost of the same, kalamene pipe being used, will be \$18,751. If riveted pipe is used for mains, the cost will only be \$16,121. The latter system is considered the best, and being much cheaper, will probably be selected. The estimates do not include pumping station or engine, as Mr. Oilier recommends that the pumping be done by either the flouring or planing mills. If arrangements can be made to that end, it is the intention of our committee to have a special session at an early date, at which the time for holding the special election to vote bonds will be fixed. If the Gazette knows itself, Hepner will have fire protection of the best before the year is ended. Our citizens will remember that as soon as our charter can be amended, the town can have a gravity system, but in the meantime Hepner should protect herself against the ravages of fire, even at considerable expense. The reservoir and all mains of the pumping system are just that much completed on the proposed gravity system.
