This class of timber Mr. Mallory is using in making lumber which he is delivering in Heppner all the way from \$15 to \$30 per thousand feet, depending on the quality, and whether desired rough or dressed. The same can be bought at the mill at prices ranging from \$8 to \$25 per thousand. He has a general assortment on hand at present, and is sure to satisfy customers.

COUNCIL MEETING.—Council met in regular session Monday evening, Recorder Roberts, acting mayor in absence of Mayor Mallock. Councilmen present, Garrigue, Lichtenhal, Gilliam and Patterson. Minutes of regular and special meetings read and approved. Charter granted the Heppner Hook and Ladder Co. On motion of Gilliam, seconded by Lichtenhal, a lamp was ordered placed in front of the engine house, to be lighted at the expense of the town. On motion of Patterson, seconded by Gilliam, grade ordered established in the T. B. Howard district of Heppner, and referred to the committee for immediate action. Bills allowed: S. P. Garrigue, \$26.25; J. W. Rasmus, \$2; Multnomah Printing Co., \$7.50; J. R. Grover, \$25.00; Gilliam & Bisbee, \$6.00; Emery Oliver, \$17.25. Letter and specifications from Emery Oliver read and ordered filed. It was the opinion of the council that a special election for voting bonds should be held at the earliest possible date. On motion of Lichtenhal, seconded by Gilliam, the finance committee was ordered to examine reports of recorder, treasurer and marshal and report at the next meeting.
