THE FOLLOWING IS THE ORDINANCE BEFORE THE COUNCIL AT PRESENT: ORDINANCE NO. 48. An ordinance for the purpose of issuing bonds for supplying the town with water.

THE TOWN OF HEPPNER DOES ORDAIN: Section 1st. That there shall be a special election of the tax-payers who are legal voters of said town, held on the 3rd day of May, A. D., 1892, for the purpose of authorizing the town council to issue and dispose of bonds of said town of the denomination of from \$100 to \$1,000 as the purchaser may desire, with interest coupons attached thereto, the par value of which shall not exceed the sum of \$15,000 in value.
