## FIELD AND GARDEN

OUR AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES.

Beautiful and Diverse Productions of the Different Sections of the United States.

So vast and grand are the agricultural resources of the United States that there is no day in all the year on which we are not harvesting in some section products from our soil. A glance at the different portions of the country shows the diversity of these products and tells us why we may claim to be the best food nation in the world.

Upon the Pacific slope we have the soil and climate that is best adapted to the products of the vine and the growing citrus fruits. Within an hour's ride by short time vineyards and orchards have been planted there, and their fruits—grapes, oranges, lemons, olives, figs, apricots, prunes, as well as honey, etc.—are now familiar in every market of our country. These, with their other products, such as wheat, raisins, almonds, etc., will soon free us from any need of dependence upon the fruit regions of some foreign Europe.

The great northwest is almost a synonym for "No. 1 Hard," and its development within two decades has been such that it might almost have supplied the world with wheat. In connection with the great corn fields of the central prairie states, it has furnished us with an abundance of the staple food supplies, and has given us in many years a surplus to send abroad. The surplus of agricultural products that our country has produced in this direction has been such that they have only to travel along our northern border and observe the great areas yet untouched by the plow. When a greater output is needed, it will be seen that our grain farmers of the next decade will surprise us as much as did those of the last.

In New England the dairy, the orchard and the poultry have largely taken the place of grain and stock. These industries are better adapted to the prevailing conditions, and proximity to the markets of the great manufacturing towns thus enables them to get the greatest return from their acres.

Throughout all the middle south cotton is king, and its production is so great that it is constantly the largest single export of our country. Regarding this section, it may be noted in passing that there is now a tendency toward a greater diversification of crops, and while there will not be less cotton grown in the aggregate, the individual farmer will place less entire dependence on this, and will aim to grow more of such crops as are needed for his own sustenance.

From the extreme southern portions of our territory we get, on the west, rice and sugar; and on the east the tropical fruits, such as the banana, coconuts, guavas and pineapples, and, again, the citrus fruits, as in California, as well as an endless variety of subtropical products. Except within comparatively narrow limits we have not yet begun to test our powers of production. There are great grain fields yet to open in the north and west, and in the southeast as well, when we shall have been fully to avail ourselves of the aid of irrigation. There are fruit lands yet to be planted in California and Florida, and along our almost untouched gulf coast, and cotton has not yet begun to reach its limit.

The greatest value of the foregoing hasty sketch made by The American Agriculturist is, according to the authority quoted, the opportunity it still suggests to young men who are industrious and ambitious cannot do better than to turn their thoughts in this direction. So great is the diversity of employments offered that one may follow his own inclinations in choosing his place and his work. Agriculture has never offered so many alternatives, nor has it ever been so safe a calling as it is to-day. Whoever enters the agricultural field and persevering young farmers may cast their lot, be it east or west, north or south, they may find within easy reach the means for the realization of their fondest hopes—the founding of a happy home, the aim of every true man and woman.

A French Experiment on the Potato. Conclusions drawn by the French experimenter, M. Girard, in the cultivation of the potato in France, and of interest to American growers, are as follows: As between whole and cut seed, with crops grown side by side, the preference was given to whole seed and the practice advised to select for such use the medium or average size of the variety grown. While studying the selection of seed potatoes, M. Girard was led to believe that tubers which produced good crops would convey their productive qualities to the succeeding crop, and that those which produced a limited yield also perpetuate a tendency to lighter crops. He thus became satisfied that the productive strength of the potato was hereditary, and that the cultivator should select seed from those plants which give high returns.

It is interesting to note that the public schools of each city and town lead in the local celebration. These two bodies have also appointed a joint executive committee to direct the movement and to prepare a uniform and fitting programme for universal use.

Every wide-awake boy and girl in our land has read or will read the message issued by the Columbian public school celebration committee which has interested it. It speaks a vigorous word to every one of the several million pupils in our public schools. How far the spirit of this message is carried out depends upon each individual boy and girl. We believe they will respond to it promptly and enthusiastically. They are too thoroughly imbued with the true spirit of American loyalty and patriotism to permit such an opportunity to be lost.

It will enter into the spirit of this important event with characteristic American energy and determination.

It is an inspiring thought that on Oct. 12 all the loyal sons and daughters of our land will be united by one common purpose of such lofty conception. We believe that the pupils in our public schools will prove as enterprising and intelligently patriotic as those of any city or town in America. Don't wait until the eleventh hour. If our schools are to attempt to be the center of a local celebration which shall be worthy of the day there is none too much time for preparation. Let the schools begin at once. Teachers and scholars should make common cause.
