STABBING AFFRAY.

Paul Schiller, Budy Coy, by The Notorious Frank McIntire—Keats' Arrest and Shot at by The Marshal.

Last night about 11:30 Paul Schiller was stabbed by Frank McIntire, in front of the Natter saloon, opposite the Gazette office.

McIntire is a notorious character, who, when filled with that which cheers and also makes drunk, is quarrelsome and mean with it. Last night he came into Natter's place and demanded a drink, but being pretty full, was refused. This angered him considerably and he proceeded to curse and rave, intermingled with threats.

Billy Lord, who has charge of Mr. Natter's place, on evening, ordered him out of the house. McIntire says, "You can't put me out." Mr. Lord then opened the door and fastened it back so that he would have a clean sweep. Coming back to where McIntire was standing, the latter immediately went down into his clothes for a weapon. Mr. Lord said if he did not go out he would send for the marshal. McIntire said, "D—n the marshal," but backed towards the door.

Paul Schiller, Ben Kibbourne and Sam Walker were playing a sociable game at a table near by, and on hearing McIntire's talk, one of them said, "Billy you don't have to send for the marshal tonight; let me take care of you." McIntire used abusive language, and dared them out on the sidewalk. All followed, a scuffle ensued and in a moment Schiller came in and said that he was cut. An examination revealed a stab just below the left nipple which had struck a rib, this, probably, saving his life. It was evidently made by an upward thrust of a knife, as Schiller's clothing showed a cut several inches below the wound.

In the meantime McIntire had gone down to Thompson & Binne's stable and with knife in hand, had forced Mr. Binne to saddle his horse. Schiller and others who came up he held at bay. Young Fleming was forced to hold the outer and assist Mr. Binne. Marshal Keams had been notified and just as he struck Main street, he came across McIntire on his horse, endeavoring to get out of town. Mr. Keams called on him and McIntire answered by a dig in his horse's flanks, and a spirited answer from the animal. Mr. Keams then fired at him with his pistol. McIntire still kept up his gait, the Marshal firing two more shots, but he did not stop and rode on out of town up E. Main street.

Sheriff Noble and Deputy Fitzgerald were immediately notified, and getting out a warrant, followed by their men, overtaking him near McIntire's place. About noon today they arrived here with him. His examination was held this afternoon, at which time we learn that he was bound over to await the action of the jury.

Frank McIntire is a hard case, but generally takes the dead watches of the night with his skin full of bug juice to do his dirty work. The Gazette is informed that he killed a man some years ago for which he was supposed to be hanged, but he got a new trial and was cleared. Afterward he stabbed a man at Boise for which, it is said, he served a term. Such men as McIntire are not wanted in a peaceful community like this, and the sooner he is behind the bars for good, the better. He has been a source of trouble to our town authorities since his first appearance in the community.

A Broken Rib.—Bill Tillard had the misfortune to fall, while trying to pass from one train to the another, below Lexington a few days ago, when a rib was broken. He suffered considerable inconvenience for several days before he was aware of the nature of the injury. A physician located the nature and extent of the same, and now Bill thinks that he's unlucky. There has been more than one man hurt while trying to get on or off moving cars.

SKELETON FOUND.—While working the roads near Hardman on Rock creek Monday of this week, Eb. Dikeson and Abe Leulling uncovered the skeleton of a white man. The remains has evidently been there some years, as the bones were badly decayed. It was on the surface, having been covered with shell rock. How he came there will, perhaps, remain a mystery.
