mething About the Building and Institution Which Some Town in Eastern Oregon Will Get Very Soon.

The E. O., in a recent issue, gives the following description and facts relating to the insane asylum soon to be located in Eastern Oregon:

The main asylum building shall be built of brick or stone, and shall be of have a capacity sufficient for the accommodation of 400 insane patients. The supervisors shall prosecute the work with all reasonable dispatch, and withluthe period of 18 months from the time the act shall become a law shall have the insane asylum building, outbuildings, adjuncts, etc., fully completed, turnished and equipped and ready for occupancy. For this purpose the supervisors shall have power to make all necessary contracts, purchase materials and appliances, and employ artesians and laborers. They shall, however, be subject to and under the nitimate direction of the board of commissioners of public buildings, and shall conform to and obey all orders and regulations which may be made or given from time to time by the board with reference to the work.

When the building is completed and furnished with all necessary outbuildings, and not later than February 1, 1894, such proportion of the insane then confined in the asylum at Salem as the board of commissioners may deem best, to the number of not less than 150, and not more than 250, shall under the direction of the board and of the superintendent of the asylum, be removed from the asylum at Silem to the new Eastern Oregon asylum. The selection of insane persons to be transferred shall in the first instance be made by the superintendent of the asylum at Salem, colored girl, and his wife told him that but his selection shall be subject to approval or rejection by the board of ommissioners. Except for good reasons, those thus removed and transferred shall be inmates from counties of

Oregon east of the Cascades, Before the removal of patients to the new asylum the board of commissioners shall appoint a superintendent of the Eastern Oregon insane asylum, and such assistance, physiciaus and attendants as shall be necessary, who shall hold their positions during the pleasure

of the board. After the removals are provided for above, all persons committed from Grant, Harney, Malheur, Baker, Union, Wallows, Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Sherman shall be committed to the Eastern Oregon asylum; the insane from all the other counties of Lake, Klamath, Crook and Wasco may be sent to either asylum which may be designated by the proper authorities of the counties in
