John Tarley, who is tending camp for the Hayes Bros., spent the 4th in town. He will remain till fall in the vicinity of Austin station.
Jim Young's horses became frightened on the 4th, down near W. B. Potter's, and did him some damage by the lines. They were not latched to the wagon at the time.

A. E. Wright was in from Hardman yesterday. A number of Hardman people went up to Parker's mill to attend the 4th of July picnic and ball. A good time is reported.

COUNCIL MEETING.—On last Monday evening, Heppner's council met in regular session, Mayor Simons presiding and all councilmen present.
Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Bills allowed: Heppner Light & Water Co., \$100; J. H. Koltman, \$2; J. W. Rasmus, \$74.50; A. A. Roberts, \$16.66. Continued till next meeting: Heppner Light & Water Co., \$200, interest paid by them on account of delay in sale of bonds; Dr. J. J. Bills, \$1.50. Witness fees: H. V. Gates, \$14.80, expense in making sale of bonds. Matter of Long & Scott's, laid over till next regular meeting.

Council instructed the committee on fire and water to secure from school district, if possible, use of building on old property for use of fire apparatus.
The matter of putting in a water-trough was deferred for the present. J. D. Hamilton instructed to collect \$200, balance due on bond sale from F. W. Paxton, Portland.
Petition to close business houses on Sunday, laid on the table.
Marshal's salary discontinued for the present on account of shortage of funds, and for the time being, put on a fee basis. Mr. Rasmus still continues to discharge the duties of marshal.
Report of treasurer called for and postponed till next regular meeting. Adjourned.

TUESDAY'S DIVERSIONS.—Frank McIntire became intoxicated on the 4th, and used bad language on the street in the presence of ladies. Charley Charlton remonstrated with him and McIntire called him a "red-shirted." He kept up his fighting lick, and soon came to grief in front of Hatt & Matthews' barber shop. Charlton gave him two or three pretty hard raps in the face, and Marshal Rasmus then took him in. Later on F. W. Housman, a young man who had been working for Ed. Day, was put in, considerably intoxicated. On Wednesday morning, Housman was found badly disfigured with two front teeth missing, all of which he laid to McIntire. Both were fined the regulation, and then McIntire was re-arrested and taken before Judge Esallook, who fined him \$15 and costs on a charge of assault and battery. In default of payment, he is serving time in the county jail. Housman feels much aggrieved over the loss of his teeth, and threatens to sue the town.

SPOKANE RACES.—The Spokane races opened on the 4th with a large attendance. The five-eighths race was won by Little Joe, Later on second and Champagne third. The trio were followed by a big field. The time for the distance was 1:34. On Wednesday Cora Jones, the Heppner two-year-old, won the half-mile dash, but the judges declared that this second horse, Vanavana, had been guided and declared it no race. Champagne was in the five eighths race which was on the program yesterday, but it is not yet known whether he won or not.

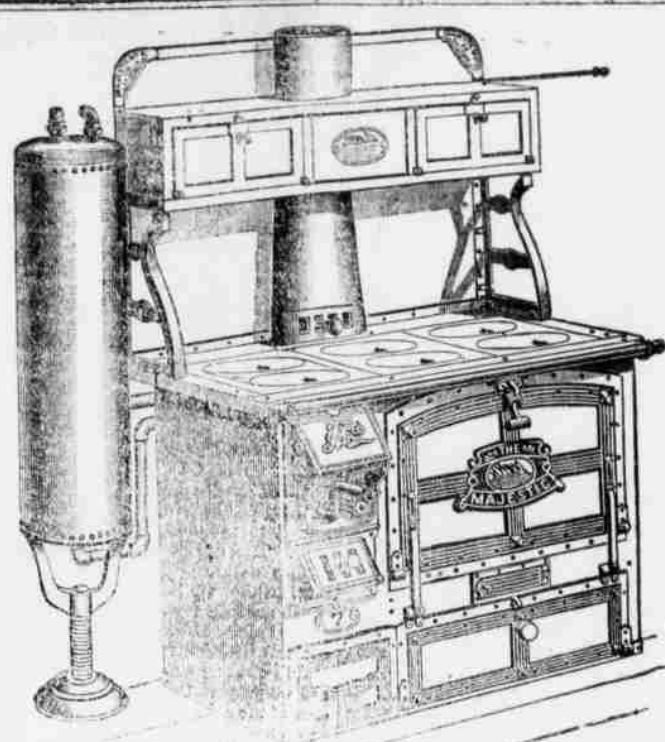
