COLONEL HUGHES, of Kansas, has been dishonorably discharged for refusal to disband the republican house of the Kansas legislature last winter.

SENATOR MITCHELL thinks that instead of increasing the ratio, we should decrease it to 15% to 1. France's ratio, His speech Tuesday was well received.

The men who robbed the Delta Colo., bank last week have been identified as Tom and Fred McCarty, father and son. Billy McCarty, a brother of Tom McCarty, escaped.

The San Jose Mercury was fined for contempt of court, caused by publishing the details of a divorce trial. The paper appealed and the decision of the lower court was reversed.

SENATOR DOLBEY says if he were going to vote for free silver he would favor 15 to 1. But as he don't favor it at all, it matters little how the senator speculates on the subject.

SECRETARY CARLISLE now admits that no form of paper money, except gold certificates, have been redeemed in gold since Feb. 4th. This does away with further excuse to fight the Sherman law.

THERE is now in silver bullion, held by the government, \$174,061,242, (coined value), and under the Sherman act, subject to coinage, if the government wills it.

THE house of lords rejected the Irish home rule bill by an overwhelming majority. Gladstone will probably appeal to the people for justification of his policy. There is, and has been for years, among the common people of the United Kingdom, a bitter sentiment against the upper house of parliament.

FRANCE has \$18 per capita in silver; we have \$8. France is prosperous. Taking the gold-bug cry of "danger line," we can yet increase \$10 per capita in silver and then be sold as a rock, even in the eyes of the mighty England, our financial God, so with the gold-bug.

WE are reliably informed that the report current about a large part of the state school funds being tied up in one

of the suspended Portland banks has no foundation whatever. It was published generally in the press of Oregon, and it is a wonder that the matter has not been noticed before.
