ODD WAYS OF OSTRICHES.

The Males Drand Over the Young and Capture Each Other's Families The ostrich has many strange ways and I was particularly interested in studying them, says a writer in Forest and Stream. They go in flocks of three

or four females and one male about their nesting time, and for several weeks before locating their nexts the hens drop their eggs all about the para pns. These are called haucho eggs (pronounced "watcho"), and are much more deliente in flavor than the eggs

taken from the nests. They have a thinner shell, and when fresh laid are of a beautiful golden color. We cooked them by rousting them before the fire. We would first break a hole in the small end of the egg large enough to insert a teaspoon. The egg would be set up among some hot ashes, a pinch of salt and pepper put into it, and the contents kept stirred with a stick so that all would be done alike. The flavor is excellent, and one egg would satisfy a very hungry man.

As soon as the ostriches decide upon a suitable place for a nest, the male bird scratches away the grass and slightly hollows out the ground for a space of about three feet in diameter. All the hens of the flock lay in the same nest until there are from twentyfive to thirty-five eggs laid. 


