

A very common form of bac-teria is that known as the bacterium fermo, which is an elongated, rod-like cell about 1-25,000 of an inch in breadth and less than twice its breadth in killed by antiseptics, and is always found in putrefying or septic fluids; hence it is sometimes called the carrion or septie fungus.

Cold (32 degrees Fahrenheit) suspends the animation of pacteria, but does not kill them; many withstand a much lower temperature. Boiling water kills many bacteria, but those that are in the condition of spores can withstand a much higher temperature or can withstand the temperature of 219 degrees Fahrenheit for a much longer In general terms extremes of heat have a more destructive action to bacteria than extremes of cold. Heat without moisture does not necessarily destroy try them.
