Biggest Man in Canada. Leonard Whitton, of Brighton, is not classed as the biggest man in Canada. He weighs 459 pounds. His measurement is as follows: Around the shoulders, 5 feet 6 inches; chest, 5 feet inches; hips, 6 feet 2 inches; neck, 1 foo 11 inches; arm at shoulder, 2 feet inches; arm below elbow, 1 foot inches; thigh, B feet 9 inches; calf, feet. Ten years ago he did not weigh more than 150 pounds, and during the past few years he has increased in weight rapidly.
