The republican candidate for justice of the peace for Dist. No. 6, Morrow county, has the distinction of being a native son, having been born in Albany, Linn Co., Jan. 28, 1866. Here he attended school till his parents' removal to Crook county, this state, again entering school, completing his education in the Ashland Normal College in 1886, graduating at that institution. He then followed school teaching in Coos county the summer of 1886, and the following fall accepted a position as book-keeper in The Bank of Ashland, remaining there until Feb. 1891, when he took a course of stenography and typewriting in Holmes Business College, Portland, completing at Heppner permanently in March, 1892. Until June, 1893, Mr. Freeland held the position as stenographer or the firm of Brown & Hamilton, and at this time became a member of the firm, Mr. Brown retiring, Last Feb. 7th, Mr. Freeland purchased Mr. Hamilton's interest and has since conducted the business alone. Mr. Freeland's thorough knowledge of business and of the common law and code of Oregon, renders him a very competent man for the office of justice of the peace. The business of the 6th Dist. is such that often very fine points of law have to be decided, and the voters of this district do not desire to take any chances by electing an incompetent man to this important position. In politics, Mr. Freeland has always been a republican, supporting Benjamin Harrison for president both in 1888 and 1892. And if the voters of this vicinity desire to reflect credit and honor on the local judiciary, they will vote for E. L. Freeland for justice of the peace of the 6th district. EVANS AND SONTAG.

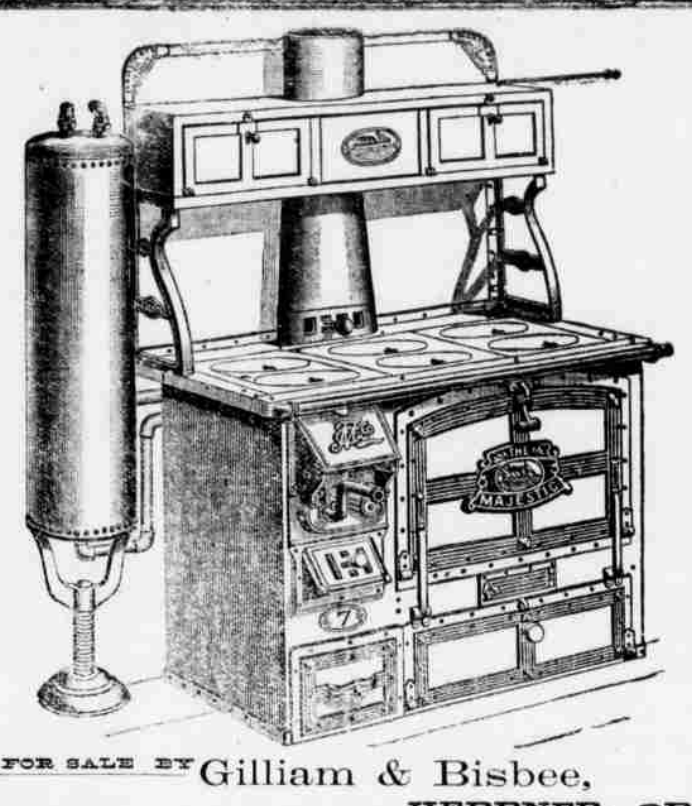
