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



It is satisfactory to be told by Mr. Ellis that blindness in England is "slowly decreasing," says the Specta-tor, though Great Britain still stands in this respect behind two other European countries, and three more come before Ireland. Shortsightedness, however, appears to be increasing everywhere, Germany having a signal and sinister preeminence in this re-

spect.
