SCHOOL MEETING.—At the school meeting of the taxpayers of district No. 1 yesterday, at the court house, a fair representation of citizens were present and considerable interest manifested in the matter of voting a tax levy. The question was thoroughly discussed pro and con and finally a vote was taken on the advisability of levying a 20 mill tax with which to pay present indebtedness, resulting in the defeat of the measure by a vote of 39 to 22. On motion, a committee of two, consisting of Messrs. Frank McFarland and George Conser, were appointed by the chair to visit the school and interview the teachers relative to a reduction in salaries, and being unable to accomplish any good in that direction the committee returned and so informed the meeting. A motion was then made to vote a tax levy of 2 1/2 mills; this was amended to levy a 10 mill tax, followed by an amendment to levy a 15 mill tax. The chair left the matter to a rising vote of the house and a ten mill tax levy was compromised on to be voted for. On ballot being taken the ten mill tax levy for school purposes was voted by a vote of 33 to 30.

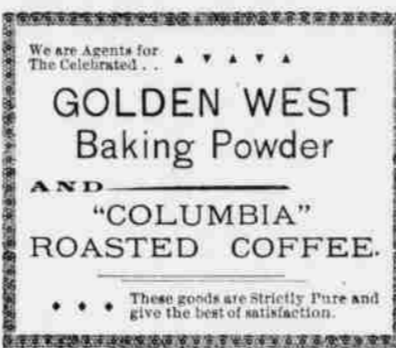
