To SETTLERS.—A very important act to settlers on public lands has recently received the signature of the president. It amends section 1. of the act of March 2, 1889, by adding thereto the following provision: "That if any such settler has heretofore forfeited his or her entry for any of said reasons, such person will be permitted to make entry of not to exceed a quarter section of any public land subject to the homestead law, and to perfect title to the same, under the same conditions in every respect as if he had not made the former entry." This law will help many a worthy man to a homestead who has heretofore been debarred therefrom.


