**HEARD FROM THE CHURCH**

Gault, of Moscow, and a number of others, says the East Oregonian, came in from Boise City Saturday evening and went north Sunday morning. They had been present as members or spectators at the Idaho legislature, which has just elected Senator Shoup to succeed himself.

The deadlock was broken by the Mormon members, acting, it is thought, under advice from Salt Lake church officials, who advised that a sufficient number of Sweet's supporters go to Shoup to elect. This was done after sixty days of ceaseless struggling and bitter political fighting. The company of politicians who were here Saturday night were mostly Sweet men, and consequently felt a keen disappointment that their favorite, Willis Sweet, congressman from Northern Idaho, was not victorious. The northern part of the state was strong in support of Judge Sweet, who is said to be the most popular man in Idaho.
