QUICKEST HANGING ON RECORD Legal Execution Performed Inside of Four

Minutes to Accommodate Reporters. Capt. J. B. Patten, warden of the Indiana state prison at Jeffersonville, has the record for superintending the quickest legal hanging ever accomplished in this or any other country, says the St. Louis Republic. The laws of Indiana prescribe that the death sentence must be executed between midnight and the dawn of the day set by the court. A man named Stone had butchered a whole family in Davis county, of that state, and had been condemned to death. The case was a celebrated one, and newspaper men from Indianapolis and Louisville went down to Jeffersonville in a perfect phalanx to witness and report the famous criminal's exit from this vale f tears. They arrived in the early evening, expecting to return to their homes on a train leaving Jeffersonville about one o'clock, by which time they expected the execution to be over. To their intense disappointment and chagrin they discovered that the last
