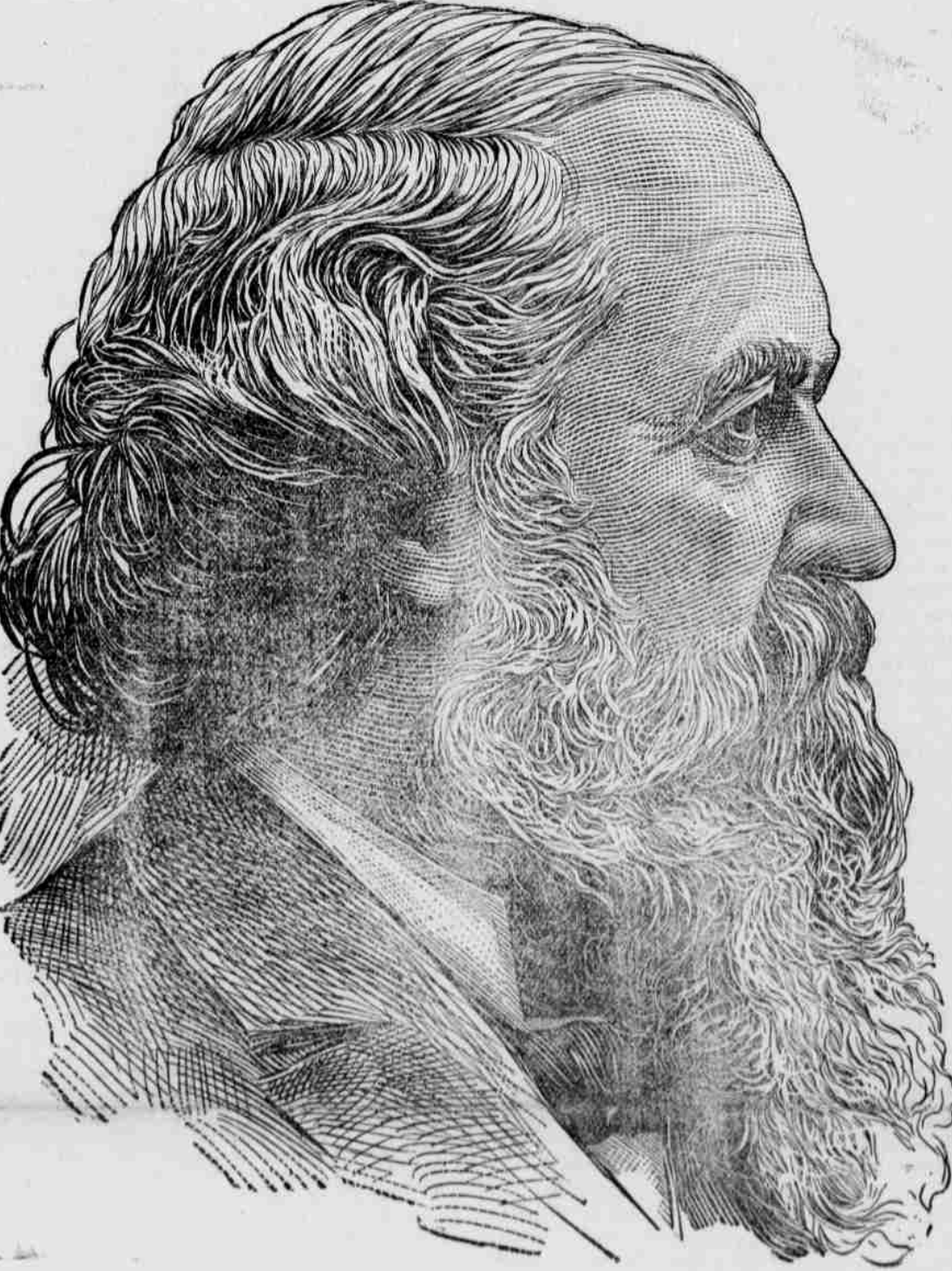
ONE NEVER KNOWS. (To the memory of the absent one.) One never knows what will happen Before the night is ended, Or the morrow has begun.

HOUSEKEEPING SIMPLIFIED.

Use washing soda in boiling water to remove green stains from your brick walk.
