INCENDIARISM.—Early Monday morning, Chas. Cunningham's Birch and Butter creek ranches were visited by an incendiary, or incendiaries, destroying considerable property. On Birch creek the dwelling house, granary, two big barns, half a dozen sheds and other out-buildings, grain, hay, harness, groceries, provisions and implements went up in smoke. On Butter creek the loss included a big sheep barn, big horse barn, granary and storehouse, store and implement house, hay, grain, implements and 1000 thoroughbred Merino bucks.

Tuesday morning at the Birch creek ranch occurred another fire, taking the last of the improvements on that ranch, and destroying 240,000 pounds of wool. At the very time that the building and wool were fired, Mr. Cunningham and some wool handlers were camped near by watching the wool, and were to have commenced hauling the wool to Pendleton Tuesday. About daylight the men, worn out from loss of sleep, dozed off, and then the work of destruction was inaugurated. Judging from the tracks, two men set out the fire, but they could not be tracked very far. There is a chance for some local man to do some good detective work.

Deceased had a bullet hole in his head and a hasty examination of the remains led the old gentleman to conclude that the young man had committed suicide. An alarm was given and E. J. Merrill came down to town to get the proper officer to go out and hold an inquest. Coroner Ayers is absent and Judge Frelund was on the eve of departure for Portland and could not go, so Judge Tom Carl consented to go out and conduct the inquest. He was accompanied by Constable Wheatstone. Compton was 23 or 24 years old, and unmarried. About two years ago he was afflicted with scrofula but got better. Lately he had been suffering from an attack of grip, but was out to Sunday school last Sunday morning and seemed in fair health. Late Wednesday evening he was at John Howell's, and this was the last seen of him till found dead. Temporary insanity was probably the cause.
