THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EUGENE, OREGON, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Staub, Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered: An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English; an advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy; a three years course in civil engineering leading to the degree of civil engineer; a course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from the public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the preparatory department without examination. 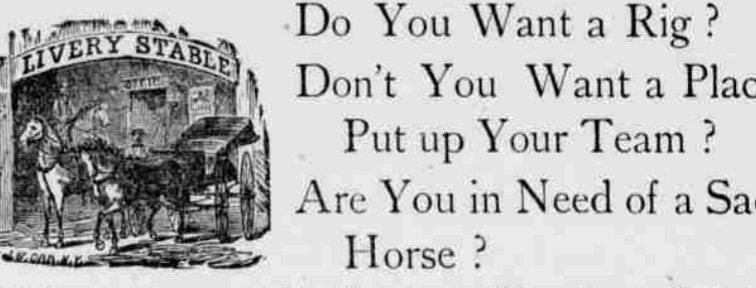
