

TO EXTERMINATE THE COYOTE.

Adjoining Counties to Co-Operate.

The coyote bounty of two dollars is working almost to perfection so far in Gilliam county, says the Fossil Journal, and these pests are being rapidly thioned out of the county. But it would work better, both for this and the neighboring counties, if Wasco, Grant, Crook and Morrow counties would follow suit and place the same bounty on coyotes killed within their borders. Here the sheepmen pay a dollar and the county a dollar per scalp, and the sheepmen will come out away ahead, even at the end of the first year (during which the greatest number of coyotes will be killed), as an assessment of half a cent per sheep, costing the sheepmen altogether about \$500, will pay bounty on 500 coyotes, each of which destroys from 10 to 50 bead of sheep, worth from \$1.50 to \$2 each, per year.
