INDIAN SCARE OVER IN HARNEY. The Reported Diamond Valley Indian Massacre a Farce.

Last Friday night, says the Harney News, the settlers in Diamond and Happy valleys became badly alarmed by reason of the supposed presence of Indians in the vicinity, immediately south, on the Steen mountain side.

It seems that during the day Bud Smith, a cattle rancher, had been riding the range, and seeing unmistakable signs of Indians, became suspicious of it being a band of hostile Buncoons, and so spread the alarm, causing such uneasiness as to put the whole country on the alert.

About midnight the people were terror-struck at seeing signal fires, several up McCoy creek, and numerous others on the adjacent mountain sides, clearly pointing to Indians close at hand.

This caused a general stampede of the settlers, who left their homes and rushed pell-mell, with the best means at command, collecting at Seaward's and Clark's ranches in Diamond valley.

Runners and scouting parties went out during the night and no more satisfactory information obtained than the capture of a Piute squaw, who claimed to be lost.

The gathering broke up on Sunday, returning to their several homes. If there is any truth in the reported Indian trouble it occurred after this incident, and as the Gazette has heard nothing more of the trouble, it believes the whole thing a farce or false alarm.

A NEW LAW That Limits the Number of Witnesses in Criminal Cases.

The following law is probably known to the legal profession, but will be news to the general public: In the session laws of 1885 is a law approved February 25, 1885, which limits the number of witnesses in criminal cases to four for each side, excepting when the county judge gives permission to subpoena more, for good reason shown.

That hereafter, in all criminal proceedings had before any magistrate in this state, the defendant and the state may each subpoena four witnesses and no more; provided, that the county judge of the county where such proceedings may be pending, may, for good cause shown, make an order allowing a greater number of witnesses to be subpoenaed by either party, in which event, said witnesses may attend and be paid as now provided by law; and provided, that this act shall not be construed to prevent any person or persons from voluntarily attending and testifying before any such magistrate, but they shall not be paid by the county where such proceedings are pending.
