

# DANGEROUS LAKES.

Mysterious Submarine Currents in Son of the Northern Waters.

Little Shuswap lake is stated to have a flat bottom, with a depth varying from fifty-eight to seventy-four feet, measured from the mean high water mark. The deepest water found in the Great Shuswap, says the Vancouver World, was five hundred and fifty-five feet, about six miles northward from Cinnemousun narrows, in Seymour arm, though the whole lake is notably deep. Adams lake, however, exceeds either of the Shuswaps, as its average depth for twenty miles is upward of one thousand one hundred feet, and at one point a depth of one thousand nine hundred feet was recorded.
