OYSTER-SHELL HOUSES.

They are Frequently Met with in Texas Towns.

"Houses built of oyster shells can be seen in a large number of Texas towns," said G. A. Holland, a well-known newspaper man, recently, says the Cincinnati Gazette. "The state was at one time undoubtedly a part of the bed of the Gulf of Mexico. How many years ago geologists do not know, and natural historians are puzzled at the forms of life, so different are they from any to be found elsewhere." Mr. Holland then proceeded to unfold a remarkable story. Running across the state from north to south, he said, is an immense ledge or sheet of rock formed of oyster shells. This ledge averages about twenty feet in thickness and is used for building purposes in some places, while in others it is ground up and placed upon the ground as a fertilizer. There is a large quarry near Henrietta, in the northern part of the state, and a number of handsome blocks have been constructed from it. When first taken out of the earth it is a white and soft, but when exposed to the air it becomes hard and turns to a beautiful buff color. It was formerly used for foundations only, but during the past few years a great many handsome blocks and residences have been built of it."
