A MURDER AT CALES.

William Fry Murders His Wife in Cold Blood.

From the Eagle.

A murder as foul and cold blooded as that committed by Hamblett two years ago, and in about the same neighborhood, has horrified the people of Mountain creek precinct. It was the deliberate shooting and killing of Sarah C. Fry by her husband, Wm. Fry.

Wm. Fry and his wife have been married a number of years, and are grandparents, she being probably 45 or 50 years of age and he 50 or 55. Until about a year ago they lived seemingly peacefully together, when they had some trouble about some cattle the woman owned which the man wanted to dispose of. The result was a separation. For the past two or three months she has been stopping in the "Basin" with her daughter, Mrs. Stone, but a few days ago left there to visit at Cales, saying she would return very shortly. Last Thursday Fry passed through Daysville with a four horse team on his way from about Canyon City where he had been stopping. The couple were former residents about Cales and fate seemed to draw them together. Fry probably reached his cabin Friday, Saturday morning, October 26, he appeared on horseback before the cabin in which his wife was stopping, near the Cales store—the old McNeal cabin—and roughly asked his wife what she did with the things she stole from his cabin. On her replying that she had taken nothing from his cabin, he grasped her by the arm and said, "Don't call me a liar." He swung her around and shot her in the face, the ball entering below the right eye and lodging at the base of the skull, fracturing the bone, but not coming through. The weapon used was a 32 calibre revolver. The woman died Sunday night.

After committing the dastardly deed, too cowardly to commit suicide, the murderer rode about two miles to the residence of W. Cowne, justice of the peace for the precinct, and Mr. Cowne not being at home, surrendered his pistol to Mrs. Cowne and delivered himself up Sunday morning he was taken to Canyon City and delivered to the sheriff.

Fry is a powerful man, with rather a forbidding countenance. A blatant, boastful man, professes of threats and consequently not looked upon as intending to perform half that he threatens. He has for some time been carrying a pistol with the avowed intention of shooting his wife, if she did not return to him. For once he kept his word.
